## Media Information

JMU home football games are played at Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field, adjacent to Godwin Hall on the JMU campus. The press box is located atop the east stands (nearest Godwin Hall), and media parking is available, as assigned, adjacent to Godwin Hall or in a parking deck adjacent to the stadium's west side.

Media credentials and parking passes must be requested through JMU's Sports Media Relations office. Credentials will be mailed or left at the "Will-Call" gate at the stadium's south end.

Radio crews broadcast from the second level of the press box. Facilities for video-taping are atop the west stands.

Media representatives working at field level must check in at the press box to secure sideline passes.

Telephones and FAX services are available, and complete NCAA statistical and play-by-play summaries will be provided.

Post-game coaches' interviews will be coordinated by JMU's and the visiting team's sports media relation staffs.

The JMU locker area is located in the Robert and Frances Plecker Athletic Performance Center, adjacent to the stadium's south end zone. The visiting locker area is located under the east stands, nearest the south end zone.

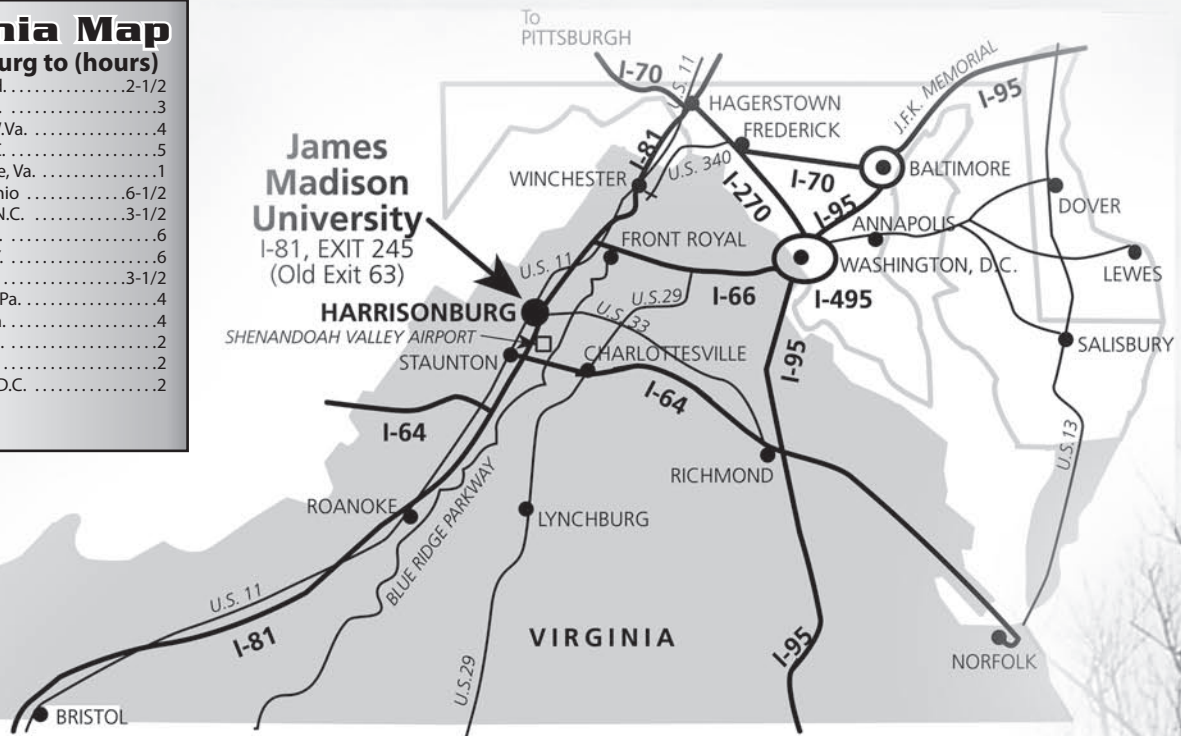

### Virginia Map

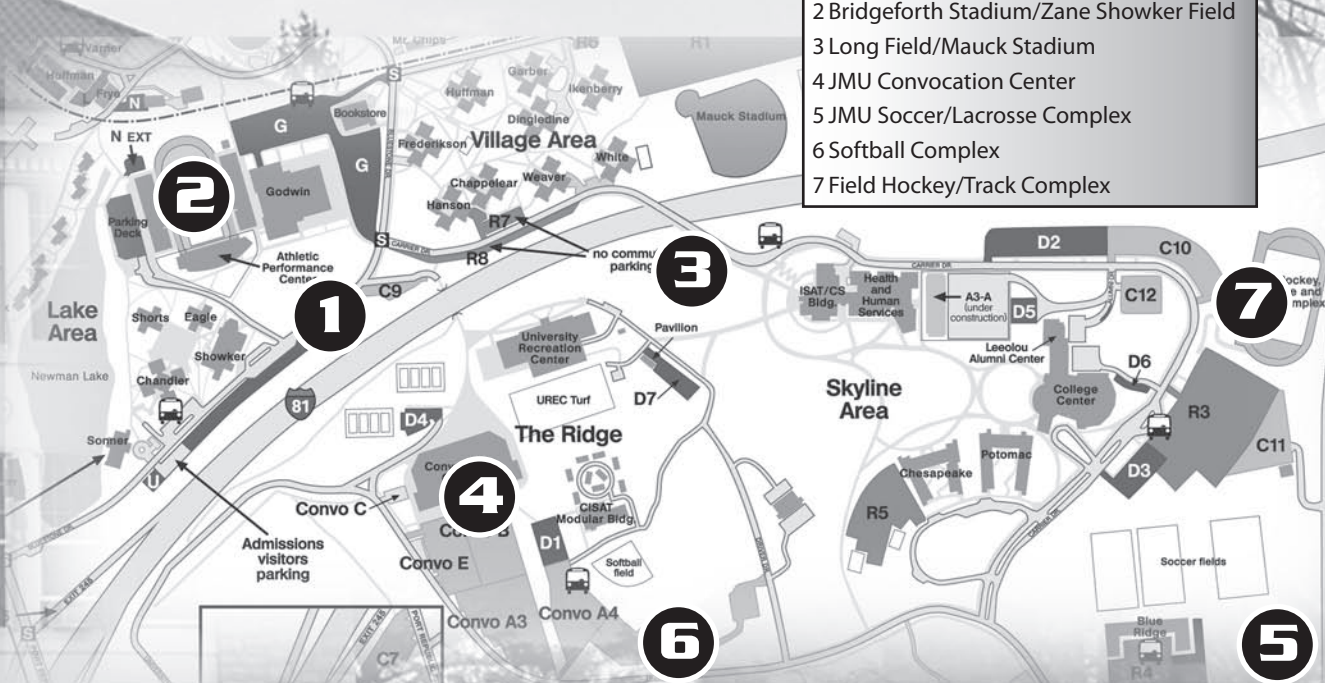

JMU's entire 2008 football schedule will be broadcast by the JMU Sports Network. The Ver Standig Broadcast Group manages the network in cooperation with JMU, and the group's WSVA-AM in Harrisonburg is the flagship station.

Mike Schikman, Curt Dudley and Karl Magenhofer are the network commentators.

Schikman, who is the network play-by-play commentator, returned to a game-site position with the network in 1991. He previously was a network commentator from 1981-86, and he handled the network's in-station broadcast responsibilities in 1989 and 1990. Dudley, the JMU athletics division's director of multi-media communications, handles color commentary during road games and coordinates network operations. He has done JMU Sports Network broadcasts at various times since joining the JMU staff in 1988. Magenhofer handles color commentary for home games and has worked with the network in various capacities for nine seasons.

A Brooklyn, N.Y., native, Schikman is a 1977 Queens College graduate. He was WSVA's sports director from 1979-86 and sports director at WORD in Spartanburg, S.C., from 1987-88.

Dudley, a Norfolk, Va., native, is a 1983 Bridgewater College graduate, and he previously worked on scholastic broadcasts for WSVA.

A Baltimore native, Magenhofer is news director at WSVA. He is a graduate of the Broadcasting Institute of Maryland and is a past president of the Virginia Associated Press Broadcasters.

WSVA's 5,000-watt signal broadcasts to listeners in the Shenandoah Valley area. Several network affiliates make JMU broadcasts available in other areas of Virginia and the Washington, D.C., area, and JMU broadcasts also are available on the internet.

In addition to game broadcasts, the network's scheduling includes a weekly program with JMU coach Mickey Matthews.

The JMU Sports Network also broadcasts JMU men's and women's basketball games.

## Nicknames, Traditions

JMU's athletic teams use the nickname "Dukes" in honor of Dr. Samuel P. Duke, university president from 1919-1949. Men's athletics began at JMU during Duke's tenure (men first enrolled in the regular season in 1946 as day students.)

Women's teams were known by several names until "Duchesses" became prevalent in the early 1940s. That name was dropped in 1982 when all of JMU's teams became "Dukes."

The school colors, purple and gold, were selected during JMU's first session in 1909-10 from the colors used by the institution's two literary societies, Lanier and Lee. The Lanier Society's colors were violet and white and the Lee's gray and gold. Violet soon was replaced by purple, which was easier to obtain for use for pennants and other decorations.

The school mascot, a bulldog with a purple and gold cape and a crown, was adopted in 1971. The bulldog is the traditional pet of royalty such as a duke.

"Duke Dog" entertains at JMU athletic contests and other university special events and also takes part in a variety of community activities and events.

JMU also has used several living bulldogs as university mascots.

Duke Dog won the "popular" vote during the 2004 Capital One Mascot of the Year competition, compiling an 11-0 record in head-to-head voting against other college mascots.

## Season Preview

### Dukes Expect To Remain Among FCS's Leading Programs

Mickey Matthews begins his 10th JMU year expecting his team to stay among the elite in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision. The Dukes in 2007 made their third playoff appearance in four years, and many of the key players from that 8-4 squad that lost only to FCS playoff teams and a Football Bowl Subdivision team return.

JMU has 15 starters among its 46 expected returning lettermen and achieved last season's success with a young squad. The Dukes are 37-13 overall and 33-11 in the regular season over the last four years.

"Last year we over-achieved for as many young players as we had and considering that our top offensive threat went out after two games," said Matthews, who is 64-44 at JMU since 1999. "With as many players as we return, we anticipate that we should have a good football team, but we have some question marks.

"Having a good team means you have a chance to win," he said. "We'll have a very competitive preseason camp; there will be some good football players who may not get a lot of playing time."

Matthews' major question is linebacker, where only one experienced player returns. Among the positives is the return of redshirt senior tailback Eugene Holloman, the aforementioned "top offensive threat," who missed most of 2007 with a knee injury after being first-team all-league in 2006. Holloman ran for 180 yards in two games last season after having 1,064 yards and eight touchdowns in 10 games in 2006.

Return Holloman to a squad that lost only nine players from its first and second units of a year ago and Matthews' optimism, both in the highly competitive Colonial Athletic Association and nationally, appears justified.

#### Outlook

JMU lost three offensive and four defensive starters and has seven returning all-league players. The key loss was free safety Tony LeZotte, the CAA defender of the year and the conference's initial four-time, first-team all-league performer and four-time All-America. LeZotte had a team-high 95 tackles in 2007 and 416 for his career, JMU's No. 6 all-time mark and its best among defensive backs.

The top returning offensive starters are senior center Scott Lemn (All-CAA first team), senior quarterback Rodney Landers (second team) and senior tackle Terrence Apted (third team). Other offensive starters back are junior guard Dorian Brooks, junior wide receiver Rockeed McCarter, junior fullback/tight end Charlie Newman, sophomore tackle Theo Sherman, and sophomore tailback Griff Yancey.

Returning defensive starters are senior end Hassan Abdul-Wahid (second-team All-CAA), senior cornerback Evan McCollough (second team), senior linebacker D.J. Brandon, junior tackle Sam Daniels, senior safety Marcus Haywood, senior cornerback Darrius Ramsey, and junior lineman J.D. Skolnitsky.

The Dukes also have returning all-league players in senior placekicker Dave Stannard (second) and senior punter Jason Pritchard (third).

Starters gone from 2007 in addition to LeZotte are wide receiver/return specialist L.C. Baker (third-team All-CAA), offensive guard Vernon Eason, tight end Marvin Brown, defensive tackle John Baranowsky (first-team All-CAA, College Sporting News All-America), linebacker Justin Barnes (second-team All-CAA), and safety Nick Adams.

JMU a year ago averaged 33.3 points and 410.0 yards (265.1 rushing, 144.9 passing) and allowed 22.1 points and 324.2 yards (126.6 rushing, 197.6 passing). The Dukes were 6-2 in the CAA and got an at-large bid to the NCAA playoffs, where they fell 28-27 at eventual national champion Appalachian State in the first round.

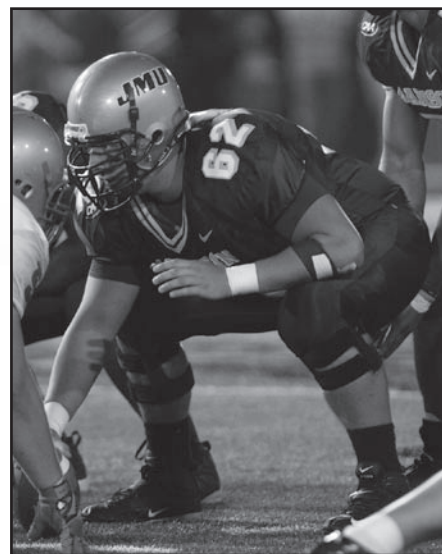
JMU in 2007 was seventh nationally in rushing, 20th in scoring and 26th in total offense. The Dukes were 22nd in rushing defense, 24th in overall defense and 29th in scoring defense. Protecting the football will be a priority after they a year ago were 82nd nationally in turn-

over margin with the loss of 15 fumbles the chief problem area.

JMU finished 2007 ranked seventh nationally by the FCS's coaches and 12th by The Sports Network. The Dukes have been among the national top 25 by The Sports Network in 50 of 53 polls since early in 2004.

#### Offense

JMU has averaged more than 32.0 points and 390.0 yards for each of the last three years, and with the return of Landers, Holloman, four of five line starters, and large groups of experienced backs and receivers expects to maintain a varied and productive offense.

# Season Preview

## Dukes Expect To Remain Among FCS's Leading Programs

"We expect to be explosive, and I like everything we're doing offensively," Matthews said of JMU's spread attack. "We expect to be good; we have good players on offense. We want to have the ability to run and to throw. All great college football teams have quarterbacks who can run and throw, and we think we have the ability to score from a long way out."

"We must improve our turnover margin," he said. "We were forced to play some of our young running backs before they were ready, and they didn't hold on to the football."

From a passing standpoint JMU has thrown only 23 interceptions in four years, only 21 by its quarterbacks.

### Quarterback

**Matthews Says:** *We believe Rodney Landers is the best dual-threat quarterback in the nation. He didn't throw the ball as well after he injured his wrist last season, but he threw well in the spring. Drew Dudzik continues to improve. Everyone in our program believes we can and will win with him.*

Senior Rodney Landers set JMU's season total offense record in 2007 (2,951) when he threw for 1,678 yards and 13 touchdowns and ran for a team-quarterback record 1,273 yards and 12 scores. In his first starting season, he completed 63.4 percent of his passes (130-205) and was 14th nationally with a 148.22 pass efficiency rating. He was second nationally among quarterbacks in rushing yards.

Landers had three of the top seven total offense games in JMU history, including a team-record 408 yards (242 passing, 166 rushing) at Rhode Island. He threw for more than 200 yards three times and had six 100-yard rushing games, including a team-quarterback-record 171 yards at William & Mary.

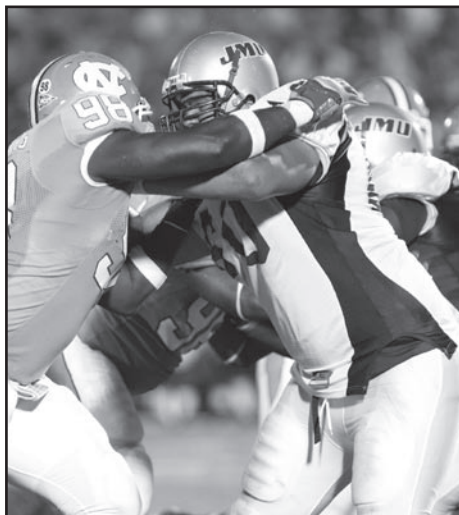
Freshman Drew Dudzik worked behind Landers, appearing in seven games and hitting on five of seven passes for 61 yards and a score. Redshirt freshman Aaron Butler joined the Dukes for spring practice and is the expected third quarterback.

### Line

**Matthews Says:** *We feel really good about our offensive line. We have really good leadership with Scott Lemn, and Terrence Apted is a third-year starter. Roane Babington really stepped up and played well in the spring, and we think he's going to be a very good player. It hurts losing Vernon Eason, but no program is immune from losing players early.*

Senior Scott Lemn, a preseason All-CAA pick, has started for most of the last three years and Apted for the last two, giving JMU two solid veterans. Junior guard Dorian Brooks and sophomore tackle Theo Sherman were starters throughout 2007, but JMU must replace two-year starting guard Vernon Eason, who left the program for personal reasons after his sophomore year.

Redshirt freshman Roane Babington moved from defense during the spring to become a top contender at guard, and junior Chris Clarke is versatile and could help at several spots. Sophomores Arthur Walker, Brett Ainsley, and Brandon

Monroe lettered in 2007, and line newcomers Donny Smith (junior), Ryan Flanagan (sophomore), Lue Akuak (freshman) and Jerald Brown (sophomore) could contend.

Smith transferred from West Virginia and Flanagan from Army; Akuak enrolled for the spring semester after a prep-school year; and Brown moved from defense during the spring.

JMU led the nation in fewest sacks allowed in 2007, six in 12 games.

#### Running Back

**Matthews Says:** *We have a lot of running backs, and we think Eugene Holloman is the best back in the nation. We could have won a national championship with him last year. It was a crushing blow not to have him; we were a different football team. Our younger backs weren't ready to play last year, but they're all improved and will challenge for playing time.*

Holloman is preseason All-CAA for the second-straight year and is a proven runner who is explosive and versatile. He had six 100-yard games in 10 games and five carries of 50 yards or more in 2006, and he has 14 receptions and two touchdown catches in the equivalent of one JMU year.

Sophomore Griff Yancey moved from receiver to tailback in 2007 and ran for 665 yards and eight scores. He had a 171-yard, two-touchdown game at Delaware and a 132-yard, three-score effort at William & Mary and for the year caught nine passes, including one for a touchdown.

Jamal Sullivan ran 36 times for 212 yards and four touchdowns in limited 2007 tailback play as a redshirt freshman, and Scott Noble ran 24 times for 97 yards and four scores as the only true freshman to play for JMU a year ago. Redshirt freshman Jon Rose and sophomore Deric Dudinski, a La Salle transfer, also are tailback contenders.

The Dukes lost 2007 senior Antoine Bolton, who ran for 627 yards and seven scores.

Junior Charlie Newman, who sees time at fullback and tight end, provides a versatile presence, and junior Trae Kenney and sophomore Ronnell Brown also are fullback candidates, Brown particularly in short-yardage situations. Kenney was a fullback a year ago after moving from defense during the preseason.

#### Receiver

**Matthews Says:** *We have a lot of receiver depth; we need for Patrick Ward to stay healthy. Rockeyed McCarter may be the best of the group; and Bosco Williams is improving. Kirby Long will improve every week; he benefitted from his redshirt year and has a different gear than the other receivers. At tight end Mike Caussin is an NFL prospect with good size and who can catch in a crowd, and Charlie Newman is a good all-purpose offensive football player who can catch and block.*

The Dukes lost L.C. Baker (28 catches in 2007), their top receiver for two seasons, but Rockeyed McCarter (junior), Bosco Williams (junior) and Patrick Ward (senior) have extensive experience. Juniors Ray Brown and Marcus Charity and sophomore Marcus Turner also are lettermen, and redshirt freshmen Kirby Long, Mike Allen, Doug McNeil and Julius Graves have worked in the program.

Ward played only sparingly in 2007 (injuries) but may be the team's most versatile receiver; McCarter led the returnees with 20 catches (two for scores) a year ago; and Williams caught 18 passes (one for a score) last season.

Brown had 10 catches a year ago but is recovering from physical problems; Turner had five catches, including one for a score, last season; and Charity has good speed and has worked as a receiver reserve. Allen worked at quarterback in 2007, and the JMU staff expects to use Long in a variety of capacities.

Caussin last season had 18 receptions, including three for scores, and averaged a team-best 15.5 yards per catch. Newman caught four passes, including one for a score, and sophomore Jason Dosh lettered at tight end last season.

#### Defense

Defense has been a JMU staple under Matthews, and the Dukes expect to continue an aggressive style that relies on speed and quickness in their eight-man front alignment. JMU has allowed fewer than 325 yards per game during each of the last four years and gave up fewer than 18.0 points per game for three years until allowing 22.1 in 2007.

"I like our defense; we should be as good as our linebackers take us," Matthews said. "We

have to work our way through August and September to determine how we'll use our players. It will be the most-athletic group we've had. Our first defense didn't give up a lot last year. We put a premium on speed in recruiting and that shows in our defensive players."

The JMU staff expects to consider several redshirt freshmen and incoming players to replace 2007 senior linebacker Justin Barnes, who took part in 94 stops a year ago. Senior Marcus Haywood, who was third on last season's team with 93 tackles as a strong safety, is the probable replacement at free safety for Tony LeZotte, JMU's top tackler in 2007 (95).

### Line

**Matthews Says:** *Our four probable starters all played well last year, and the overall group is the best we've had on the defensive line. J.D. Skolnitsky is better when we play him inside; we just need for him to add weight. Arthur Moats has a great first step and was dominant at times last year at defensive end; Hassan Abdul-Wahid is experienced as a three-year starter; and Sam Daniels made a lot of plays last year at tackle. Quintrel Thomas had a good solid spring and can help us inside or outside; Ronnell Brown showed signs during the spring of being a good player; and Dominique White makes a lot of plays.*

Senior Hassan Abdul-Wahid led last season's linemen with 64 tackles, including 2.5 sacks. Juniors Arthur Moats and Sam Daniels tied for the team lead

in sacks with 6.5 while taking part in 45 and 37 tackles, respectively, and junior J.D. Skolnitsky was involved in 53 stops while moving between tackle and end.

Sophomore Quintrel Thomas can help at either tackle or end; junior Dominique White has been a key reserve at tackle; and sophomore Ronnell Brown was a tackle reserve a year ago. Senior Shelton Johnson can provide depth at end. Thomas took part in 17 tackles, White seven, Johnson three and Brown one last season.

### Linebacker

**Matthews Says:** *Linebacker is an area of big concern for us. D.J. Brandon is a solid player, and we feel we recruited well there. We'll just have to wait and see who plays well. Jamie Veney brings some maturity for a freshman, and Vidal Nelson had a good spring.*

Senior D.J. Brandon had 75 tackles as a starter in 2007, fourth on the team, but first-year players to the position are likely to form the remainder of the linebacker rotation. Redshirt freshmen Vidal Nelson and Matt Seeger saw linebacker time during the spring, although Nelson could contend for time at safety. Junior Reggie Hicks, a converted running back, redshirt freshman Colin Fitz-Maurice and true freshman Jamie Veney are other possibilities.

Fitz-Maurice worked at safety last season, and Veney has the benefit of having spent a season at the prep-school level and brings good size and athleticism to the position as a first-year player.

### Secondary

**Matthews Says:** *The strength of our secondary should be Marcus Haywood; his natural position is free safety. Corners Evan McCollough and Scotty McGee both have good size and speed and are good tacklers. Darrius Ramsey will push both of them, and Jamaris Sanders was the most-improved player in the secondary during the spring. At weak and strong safety Pat Williams was solid during the spring, and the Gerren Griffin played the best he's played here.*

LeZotte anchored the secondary for four years, starting each of the team's 50 games, and the JMU staff expects senior Marcus Haywood to take his free safety spot. Haywood moves from strong safety, and the Dukes have starting experience at cornerback in seniors Evan McCollough and Darrius Ramsey and juniors Scotty McGee and Jamaris Sanders.



D.J. Brandon

McCollough has started since late during his true-freshman year, and McGee started late last season after Ramsey held the role for the early part of the year. McCollough had 57 tackles in 2007, Ramsey 26, McGee 18 in limited play and Sanders 16.

Junior Gerren Griffin and redshirt freshman Pat Williams were top contenders at weak and strong safety, respectively, after spring drills, and redshirt freshmen Vidal Nelson, Colin Fitz-Maurice, Jon Williams and Marcus Hunter could contend.

### Special Teams

**Matthews Says:** *We think Dave Stannard is the top placekicker in the nation, and Jason Pritchard has received a lot of first-team consideration in all-conference voting. We expect both to play leading roles for us.*

In senior placekicker Dave Stannard and senior punter Jason Pritchard, JMU has two top specialists. Stannard set a JMU season record with 85 points kicking last season when hit on 49 of 51 conversion kicks and 12 of 14 field goal tries during his first college season. Pritchard averaged 37.5 yards per punt, was the team's kickoff specialist and had a 50-yard field goal.

Junior Scotty McGee averaged 30.3 yards on 18 kickoff returns and had a return for a touchdown for the second-straight season in 2007, but the Dukes must replace L.C. Baker, who had 74 of their 102 punt returns from 2004-07.

### Schedule

JMU will play one of the FCS's top schedules, opening at FBS member Duke and facing four FCS playoff teams from a year ago.

Playoff participants from a year ago Massachusetts and Appalachian State visit JMU during consecutive September weekends, and JMU goes to playoff participant Richmond in October and hosts playoff participant Delaware in November.

JMU plays eight games in the CAA, which sent five teams to last year's postseason.

## Mickey Matthews

Head Coach

**Born:** Nov. 8, 1953 ~ **Year at JMU:** 10th ~ **Career Year:** 10th

**Graduate of:** West Texas State (1976) ~ **Hometown:** Andrews, Texas ~ **JMU, Career Record:** 64-44

Mickey Matthews has directed the James Madison University football program through an outstanding nine-year period. Poised to become JMU's all-time winningest football coach during the 2008 season, Matthews has led teams to an NCAA championship (2004) and to three other playoff appearances.

The 10th-year head coach has a 64-44 JMU record and needs but four victories to surpass Challace McMillin's (1972-84) program record for wins. McMillin, JMU's first football coach, had a 67-56-1 mark with the Dukes. Matthews' teams are 37-13 over the last four seasons and have won the program's national title and received three post-season bids during that time.

Matthews twice has won national coach of the year honors (1999 Eddie Robinson Award by The Sports Network, American Football Coaches' 2004 award) and was Atlantic 10 Conference coach of the year in 1999.

JMU in 2004 was 13-2 and the first team to reach the Division I-AA title game with three road wins. JMU won at Lehigh (14-13), Furman (14-13) and William & Mary (48-34) and beat Montana (31-21) for the national crown. The 13 wins were a team season record, and the Dukes tied their regular-season wins mark with a 9-2 pre-playoff record while tying for the A-10 title.

JMU's 2004 losses were to nationally ranked Division I-A West Virginia and to a William & Mary team it later beat during the playoffs. The Dukes beat four nationally ranked teams during the regular season.

JMU reached the 2006 playoffs while going 9-3 and 2007 post-season play while going 8-4.

Matthews led JMU to a share of the A-10 title and to the league's automatic playoff bid in 1999 during his first year as a head coach. The Dukes were 8-3 during the regular season after being 3-8 the previous year.

In 2004 he was Virginia coach of the year by the state's sports information directors and the Norfolk and Portsmouth sports clubs, Division I-AA coach of the year by the All-America Football Foundation, and recipient of the Amarillo (Texas) chamber of commerce's achievement award. In 2006, he was the Richmond Touchdown Club's Virginia coach of the year.

\*\*\*\*\*

Matthews' JMU players have received six league player of the year awards, including conference defensive player of the year during each of the last three seasons. Curtis Keaton was league offensive player of the year and Chris Morant league defender of the year in 1999; Derrick Lloyd was league co-defender of the year and received the Buck Buchanan Award as national defender of the year in 2001; Tony LeZotte was league defender of the year in 2005 and 2007; and Akeem

Jordan was league defender of the year and national defensive player of the year by College Sporting News in 2006.

\*\*\*\*\*

Matthews in 1999 took his JMU job a week before spring practice was to begin, inheriting a team that had won but five of its previous 18 games and was picked to finish next to last in the A-10. The Dukes lost their opener at eventual Division I-A national runner-up Virginia Tech but then won seven straight games and finished the regular season 8-3 overall and 7-1 in the A-10. They tied for the A-10 crown (JMU's first title in 20 I-AA years) and reached post-season play for the first time in four years.

The Dukes were named to 12 spots on the league's three all-star teams, and Keaton and Morant receiving player of the year honors was the first time in the league since 1980 that teammates won the awards. Never before had the same program gotten both player awards and the coaching honor.

Matthews was introduced as JMU's fifth head coach March 22, 1999. He succeeded Alex Wood, who resigned to become quarterbacks' coach with the NFL's Minnesota Vikings.

\*\*\*\*\*

Matthews' 2000 JMU team was nationally ranked for most of the year before finishing 6-5. Morant (defensive end), Derick Pack (linebacker), Ron Atkins (safety) and Jason Inskeep (center) were first-team All-A-10, and nine Dukes overall received all-league honors.

His 2001 team, with only 11 seniors and 54 freshmen and redshirt freshmen, was 2-9 with seven games decided by seven or fewer points.

JMU in 2002 was 5-7 and won two of its final three games with a squad that included only six seniors and five juniors. The Dukes won two overtime games, and six of their other contests were decided by seven or fewer points. JMU had eight All-A-10 honorees, including first-team defensive end Jerame Southern and return specialist Mike Connelly.

JMU in 2003 was 6-6 with a

team that had but four seniors, including Southern, a first-team All-A-10 choice and a third-team All-America by The Sports Network.

His 2004 team won seven games by 10 or fewer points and two others that were scoreless into the second half. The Dukes allowed only 86.8 yards per game rushing and controlled most of their national semifinal and final games with a bruising running attack. The balanced and deep JMU squad had only three first-team all-league honorees, including first-team All-Americans in offensive guard Matt Magerko and LeZotte, but had seven members named to the second and third all-league units.

JMU's 7-4 team in 2005 had the A-10 defender of the year and a first-team All-America in LeZotte, and in 2006 Jordan was runner-up for the Buchanan Award in addition to garnering league defender of the year honors. The 2006 Dukes had seven first-team all-league picks, and JMU was first nationally in kickoff return average (27.1 yards), second in sacks (4.0 per game), and fourth in rushing defense (84.8 yards per game) and passing efficiency (162.5).

The 2007 Dukes were 8-4 after falling 28-27 to eventual champion Appalachian State in the first round of NCAA play. LeZotte received his second league defender of the year award and All-America honors for the fourth time, and JMU was the national leader in fewest quarterback sacks allowed (0.5 per game).

Matthews coached the linebackers and defensive backs at Georgia (1996-98), which won two bowl games during his tenure. He also coached Champ Bailey, who was recognized as the nation's top defender and who was Washington's first-round choice in the 1999 NFL draft.

Georgia was 5-6 in 1996, 10-2 in 1997 and 9-3 in 1998. The Bulldogs completed 1998 having won 20 of their last 25 games, including a Peach Bowl win over Virginia (35-33) after the 1998 season and an Outback Bowl win over Wisconsin (33-6) after 1997.

With a supposedly rebuilding team in 1998, Georgia won four SEC road games and was second in the league and 16th nationally in scoring defense (17.2 points per game).

At Marshall from 1990-95, Matthews was part of a program that won the I-AA title in 1992, was runner-up in 1991, 1993 and 1995, and was a 1994 semifinalist. The Herd led the nation in scoring defense in 1993 and was seventh nationally in 1990 and 1995.

Marshall won 64 games during Matthews' six years (58 the last five seasons) and won 11 or more games and made the playoffs from 1991-95. The Herd was 45-4 at home and 15-4 in post-season play. Marshall led the Southern Conference in total defense four times (1990, 93-95), scoring defense three times (1990, 93-94), passing defense twice (1990, 94) and rushing defense twice (1992, 95). Former JMU assistant William King was an All-America linebacker and the 1993 league defender of the year while Matthews was defensive coordinator.

## His Philosophy For A Successful Program

Our first focus is to graduate every player. They're here to go to school. A lot of coaches give lip service to that, but our players will find out in a hurry how serious I am about us going to school; I want every youngster to graduate.

Secondly, I want to make sure everyone has a good time, really work at it. I'm easy to get along with, and our staff is that way. I want to make sure they have a good time because I tell all the players this will be the best time of their lives, being a college football player and attending JMU.

The third thing is that while we're graduating everybody and everybody is having a good time, we'll try to win football games. Believe me, winning is important; that's why they have the scoreboard. Winning has to be something you think about every day. Winning has to be something you don't talk about, you have to train yourself to do it. And our youngsters will do it, believe me.



## His Staff

Our two coordinators are very solid, are excellent leaders, are intelligent and good organizers, and make excellent game decisions. I really like the leadership Jeff Durden (offensive coordinator) and George Barlow (defensive coordinator) provide. They have tremendous rapport with our players, and I think that shows on Saturdays in how we play. We've always felt that we have the best strength and conditioning coach (Jim Durning) in college football, and we're happy that he's still with us.

We've had a lot of stability. You're go-

ing to have movement on a staff; you can't hide good coaches. It's a huge compliment that so many people have inquired about our assistants.

Chris Malone took over as our offensive line coach after splitting the responsibilities the year before, and we didn't lose a thing there. We lost Joe Danna (secondary coach in 2007) but brought in Mark Hendricks. They're very similar, and our coaches had worked with Mark in camps. We thought we knew what we were getting. He's fit in well and we're excited to have him.

## Strength & Conditioning Coach Jim Durning

The importance to our team of Jim Durning cannot be overestimated. His motivational and organizational skills in strength and conditioning have brought outstanding results to our entire program. He conducts an outstanding year-round program, and we are a much stronger and better-conditioned football team because of Coach Durning's work with our players. Our players have great respect for him.

## JMU's Athletic Performance Center

Not only is the Plecker Athletic Performance Center the top FCS facility in the nation, it's a top-40 end zone facility. The fact that we can combine our locker room, our strength and conditioning area, our academic support areas, our sports medicine area, and our office areas under one roof allows us to accomplish so much more than what we were able to do in the past.

More than anything else, the completion of the facility demonstrates the university's commitment to having a first-class football program. It speaks volumes to the players we would like to recruit to our program and to the outside world. We've always had a beautiful campus to recruit to; putting the facility on top of that is extremely advantageous for our recruitment of student-athletes.



## JMU's Planned Stadium Expansion

We already have an excellent playing facility but are looking forward to the next several years and the planned additions and upgrades at Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field. We've gotten outstanding support during recent seasons, and moving to nearly 25,000 seats will allow our program to continue to develop and for more of our fans to enjoy everything that's included in JMU football. Not only will there be increased seating, but everything included in the planned expansion should make for a more-enjoyable experience for all of our supporters.

## His Offensive Philosophy

We strive to be balanced because offensive football always has been about taking advantage of your available personnel. We want to be known as a multiple offensive football team that presents preparation problems to our opponents. We have a wide-open philosophy that our fans enjoy, but we don't sacrifice solid, offensive football principles.

## His Defensive Philosophy

Our base defense is an eight-man front, and we want to be extremely multiple. We want to blitz and use an attacking front. In pass coverage we play as much man-to-man as our talent allows. We place a premium on speed as opposed to size.

## His Recruiting Philosophy

We concentrate our recruiting in Virginia, the Washington, D.C., and Baltimore areas, and Eastern Pennsylvania. We hope to attract top student-athletes who are quality football players and who can contribute to JMU's strong academic environment.

We continue to recruit very well in Virginia, and that's because of the makeup of our staff. I've recruited in Virginia for more than 15 years, and (assistant) Kyle Gillenwater is a Virginia native with a lot of contacts. We have a Virginia presence on our staff, and that really helps. Four years ago we also added (assistant) Jeff Durden, who had previous coaching experience in the state. Assistants Ulrick Edmonds, Clayton Matthews and Josh Haymore played for us and have backgrounds in the state, and J.C. Price and Chris Malone have state ties after playing at Virginia Tech and coaching in the state before coming to JMU.

Comments On...

### CAA

The Colonial Athletic Association is the toughest FSC league in the country; no other conference has the quality of teams that we have from top to bottom. The 2004 season is a good example; we won the national championship, and four teams from our league made the playoffs and won games. Before the season, the coaches picked Villanova at the top of the league; Northeastern was listed by publications as one of the better teams in the country; and Maine went to Mississippi State and won. All three were excellent teams and because of one bad break or another didn't make the playoffs. I think that speaks volumes for the strength and balance in our league.

Last season the conference sent a record five teams to the playoffs, and every year we have multiple teams deserving of postseason bids.

### JMU's 2008 Recruiting Class

We signed 14 players on 18 official visits, showing that we were able to get commitments from the first group of players we recruited. No. 1, we wanted a quarterback; we targeted Justin Thorpe early and were able to sign him. We felt we had to have linebackers, and we signed who we really liked. This was our third group of recruits with our facility, and we're been able to attract a better group of players each year.

### Perceptions Of The JMU Program

We expect to be among the top FCS programs in the nation and feel that our recent success puts us in that grouping. We're 37-13 over the last four seasons, have been in the playoffs three times during that period, have won a national championship, and consistently have been nationally ranked.

One thing that puts a different light on our program is the way we won the national championship in 2004. A lot of teams have depended on home crowds to get them over the top during the playoffs. The reason we're looked at differently is that we reached the championship game by winning games in as difficult situations as you would ever want to walk into.

We feel that our players are outstanding ambassadors for our program and university. We put our recruits with our returning players, and those players do a great job conveying the many things JMU and our program can offer.



### His Attraction To JMU

What attracted me to this position was that JMU is the total package as an institution for the student-athlete. The academic reputation of the school is very high, and I always have thought that football at JMU had tremendous potential.

### JMU As A School

The best salesmen for JMU are its former students. You never find JMU alumni who don't highly recommend the university and say that their experience here was the best four or five years of their lives.

### JMU's Campus

It's impossible to visit JMU's campus and not to be impressed with its beauty and dynamic growth.

### JMU's Administration

Our administration not only has provided our support building, it also has been very supportive in helping us keep our staff intact. Our administrators continue to work to make sure that everything surrounding our program is handled in a first-class manner. They want football to be at the forefront representing JMU; and I believe that with good leadership, the sky is the limit for JMU football.

I think it is impossible to walk into our stadium and not realize that our football program gets outstanding support. President Rose, Mr. King (JMU vice president) and Mr. Bourne (athletics director) want us to be successful, but they want things to be done the right way and provide us with what we need to do so.

### JMU's Support For Student-Athletes

Our associate athletics director for student-athlete services, Casey Carter, is a cornerstone, not only for football but for the entire athletics program at JMU. She puts the students first, and it shows in how she and her staff perform in their jobs on a day-to-day basis.

### Influences In His Professional Development

I learned from my dad that hard work and perseverance are two keys to being successful. He worked seven days a week and always said that good things would come to people who worked hard. The second thing is that I'm a product of Texas high school football. I came up when Darrell Royal was at Texas, and he, Bum Phillips and Spike Dykes had a great deal of influence on the coaches in the state and on the game itself. I played for Gene Mayfield at West Texas State, and he started the Odessa-Permian dynasty. Finally Jim Donnan and Hal Mumme taught me about wide-open offenses and not being afraid to take chances.

JMU student-athletes have access to outstanding athletic training room venues, medical facilities and medical care.

Scott Cook is the football team's head athletic trainer, and he oversees all aspects of the players' healthcare needs. Cook is a West Virginia graduate, and he received a master's degree from Purdue. Before joining the JMU staff, he was an athletic trainer at Notre Dame and Illinois.

Cook is assisted by Leah Morrison, a 2007 Waynesburg graduate with a degree in athletic training and exercise science. Before entering JMU's graduate program, the Pittsburgh native completed a one-year internship at Appalachian State.

JMU teams also are served by team physician Dr. Kent Diduch and team orthopedic specialist Dr. Mark Miller.

Dr. Diduch came to JMU in 2007-08 and is a Virginia native who graduated from William & Mary and The University of

Virginia School of Medicine. Dr. Diduch is a board certified family physician and a fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians. He also serves JMU as an associate professor in the health sciences and as medical director for the athletic training and physician assistant academic programs.

Dr. Miller is the S. Ward Casscells Professor of Orthopedic Surgery and Director of the Sports Medicine Division at the University of Virginia. He is a Distinguished Graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy and the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. 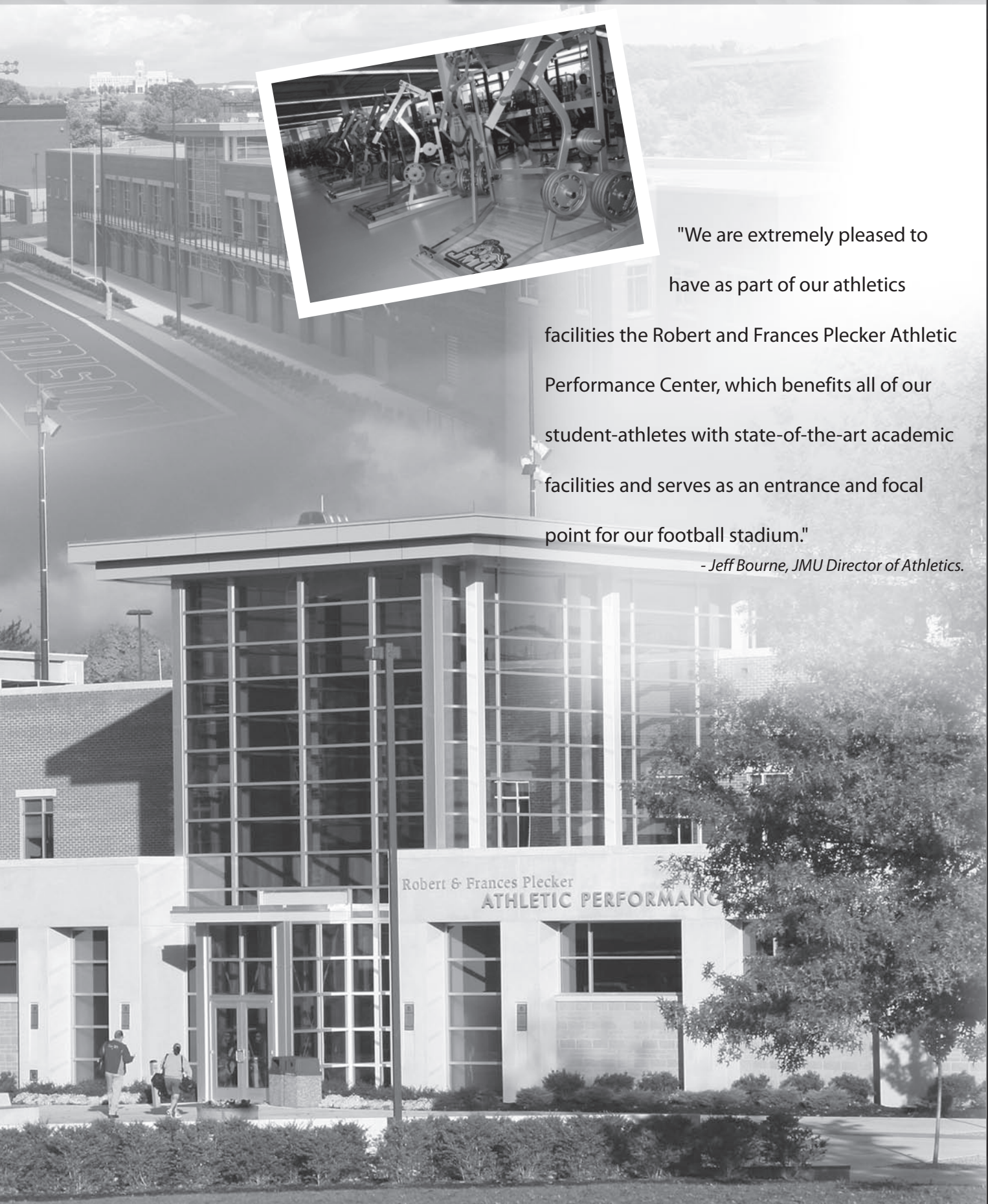

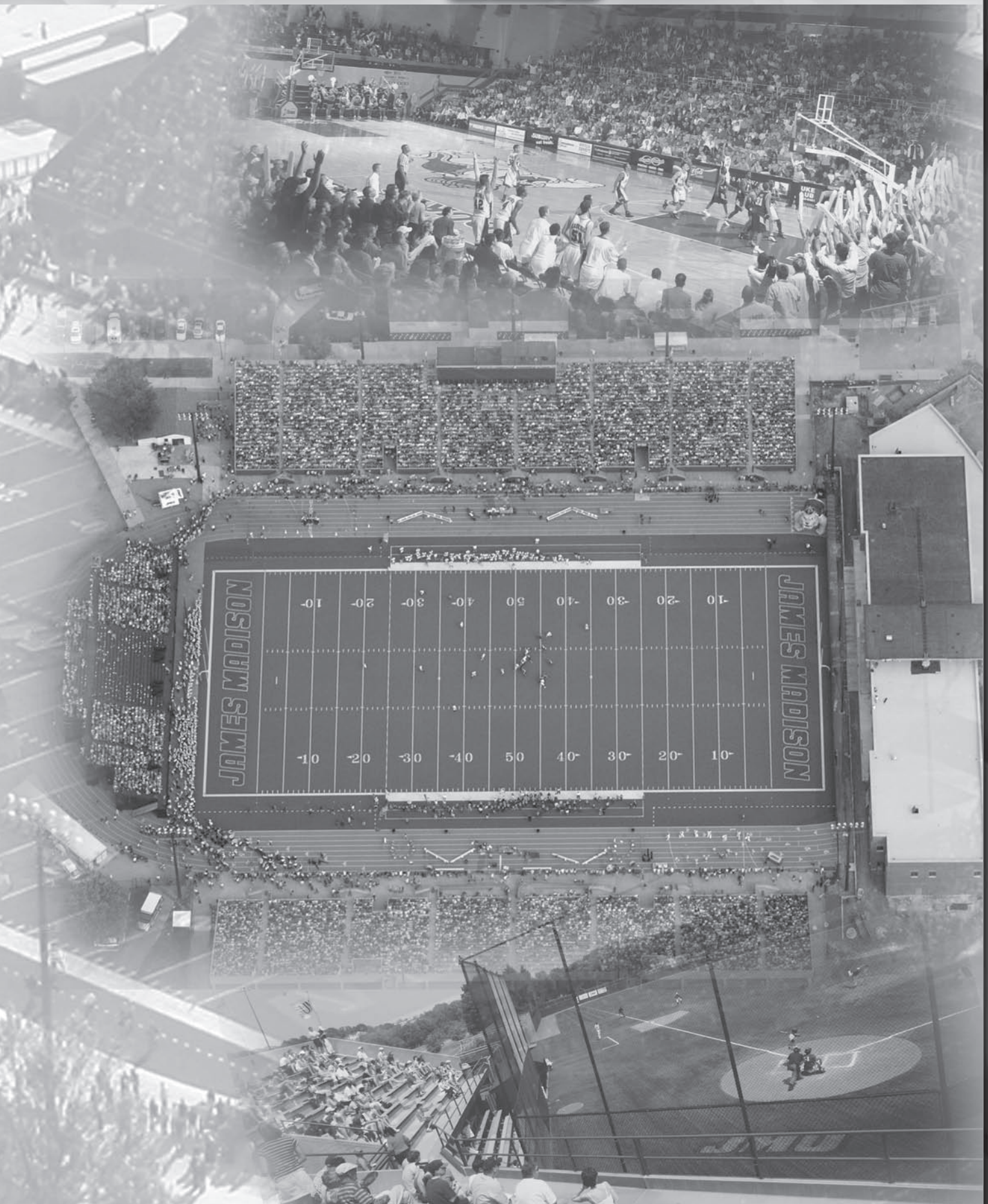


# ATHLETIC FACILITIES

- Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field, a 15,500-seat lighted facility in the center of campus, features a FieldTurf playing surface, a state-of-the-art support facility in the south end zone, and a 70-by-30 foot scoreboard with video capabilities above the north end zone.
- The stadium is named for William E. Bridgeforth of Winchester, Va., a long-time JMU supporter and board of visitors member whose family remains very active with JMU. The playing field is named for Harrisonburg-area businessman Zane Showker, a long-time JMU supporter and university board rector and for whom JMU's business school facility is named.
- The stadium was constructed in three phases. A synthetic playing surface was installed in 1973-74, the east stands (near Godwin Hall, JMU's athletics/kinesiology facility) in 1975 and the west stands in 1981.
- Godwin Hall houses a 5,000-seat gymnasium, an 800-seat natatorium and areas for strength training and indoor practices.
- A large and modern student recreation facility with lighted, artificially surfaced playing fields.
- Facilities also include the 7,156-seat Convocation Center for basketball, the 1,200-seat Long Field/Mauck Stadium baseball complex, a lighted, two-field soccer/lacrosse complex, and a lighted field hockey/track and field complex with a synthetic playing surface. Construction began during the summer on a baseball/softball complex at JMU's Memorial Hall.
- Planning is underway for construction to begin in 2009 to expand Bridgeforth Stadium to nearly 25,000 permanent seats. Enhanced seating with a club level and suites, a press box and a second tier of seating is planned for the west side of the stadium. Permanent seating is planned for the north end zone, and improved fan amenities will be available throughout the stadium as the planned \$50 million project progresses.









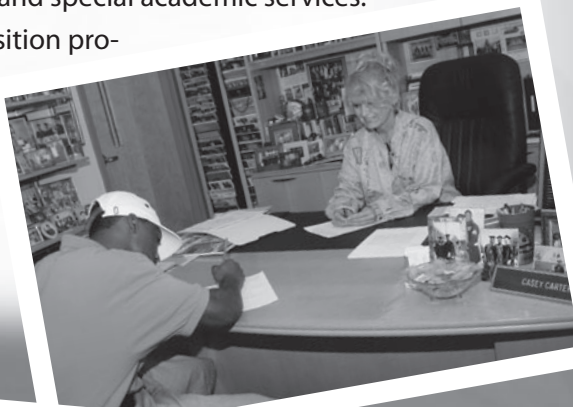

# James Madison University

James Madison University is named for James Madison, the fourth president of the United States and the "Father of the U.S. Constitution." Founded in 1908, the university celebrated its centennial with a year-long celebration during the 2007-08 academic year.

Originally a teachers college for women, JMU has operated under five names. The institution evolved into a major comprehensive, coeducational university during the last quarter of the 20th century and for the past decade consistently has been ranked as one of the finer universities of its type in the nation.

## Academic Recognitions

For 14 years in a row, the highly regarded annual survey on academic excellence in *U.S. News & World Report* has ranked JMU as the top public master's-level university in the South. JMU also had the highest graduation rate -- 80 percent -- in the South overall, public or private school, in the fall 2005 survey. *U.S. News* also gave special recognition in its "Programs to Look For" section to JMU's "First-Year Experiences," the freshman orientation and first-year-in-college academic guidance programs.

In 2008, *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* magazine ranked JMU No. 22 nationally in The Kiplinger 100, a listing of best values in public colleges; that is, schools that offer a first-class education at a reasonable price.

The *Princeton Review's* 2007 guide, *America's Best Value Colleges*, selected JMU as one of the nation's better values for a college education. The guidebook, published in spring 2006, profiles 150 undergraduate institutions that offer excellent academics, generous financial-aid packages and relatively low costs.

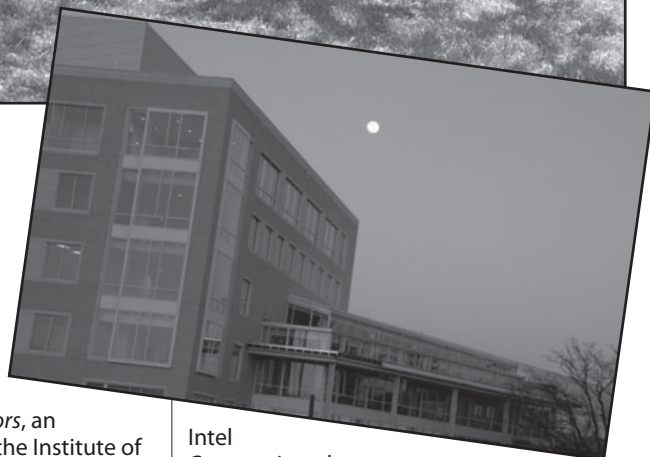
In *The Insider's Guide to the Colleges 2007*, its "Bottom Line" on JMU concludes: "JMU provides a terrific liberal arts education and continues its history of producing successful alumni today, while fostering an inclusive and high-spirited atmosphere that complements its beautiful area."

*Business Week* magazine in 2008 ranked JMU's College of Business 20th nationally among business school at public universities and 54th among all universities.

International education is a key component of the educational program at JMU. The university ranked second nationally among master's-level institutions for the total number of students who study abroad to expand their educational experience to other cultures, as reported in November 2005 in *Open Doors*, an annual report published by the Institute of International Education.

## Innovation, Recognitions

JMU emphasizes high technology as a way of life for its students and has been recognized as a national leader in providing computer skills to students. Studies by the



Intel Corporation, the *Princeton Review*, and *Yahoo! Internet Life* have ranked JMU among the nation's best in various measures of technological features available to students.

The university rapidly has moved to the national forefront with its technology programs. The College of Integrated Science and Technology is exploring exciting and innovative avenues of making technological expertise available to students.

JMU is one of seven charter members of the National Security Agency's Centers of Excellence in Information Security Education. The university is a key player in a \$6.5 million project to address the legal, technical and policy issues involved in protecting the United States' vital computer systems from cyber-attacks.

JMU offered the nation's first distance-learning-based master of science degree in computer science with a concentration in information security and a master of business administration degree with a concentration in information security.

In 2002, JMU partnered with George Mason University on the federally funded Critical Infrastructure Protection Project,

and JMU's president, Dr. Linwood Rose, was appointed as higher education's representative to the National Infrastructure Advisory Council that provides the U.S. president with advice on the security of informa-

With 53 of its alumni serving as Peace Corps volunteers in developing countries, JMU ranked 14th in the nation among large colleges (those with more than 15,000 undergraduates) for 2008. JMU had ranked second in the nation among medium-sized colleges and universities for graduates serving as volunteers with the U.S. service program in a 2006 ranking.

JMU has been cited by U.S. *News & World Report* in its ranking of the nation's top service-learning programs and by *Mother Jones* magazine, which twice has ranked JMU in its top 10 listings of campuses with active student-service programs.

## Enrollment/ Campus

Under President Rose, JMU is evolving into a new kind of American university -- one that meshes the best qualities of small liberal arts colleges with those of large research universities.

There are approximately 17,000 students at JMU.

More than 70 percent of JMU's students are Virginians with others coming from throughout the United States and more than 50 foreign countries.

The beautiful JMU campus covers 676 acres and contains 102 major buildings. The original campus is built around the Quadrangle, where buildings are constructed of native blue limestone with ivy

covering the older structures.

The food services offerings for JMU students have received accolades for years. *The Princeton Review's* annual college guide, "The Best 361 Colleges," has ranked the campus food at JMU in its Top 20 list for several years, with the university ranking No. 7 nationally in the 2007 survey.

The JMU campus covers large areas on both the eastern and western sides of Interstate 81. The two sections of campus are joined by a bridge over the highway and a pedestrian tunnel underneath it.

## Academic Programs

JMU has 106 academic programs: 68 on the bachelor's level, 30 master's programs, two educational specialist programs, and six doctoral degree programs. The university has about 2,200 full-time employees: 1,100 instructional faculty and administrative/professional faculty and 1,100 supporting staff.

There are seven colleges at JMU: College of Arts and Letters, College of Business, College of Education, College of Integrated Science and Technology, College of Science and Mathematics, College of Visual and Performing Arts, and the Graduate School.

JMU's academic program combines the liberal arts tradition with preparation for technology in a rapidly changing world. All students receive a strong foundation of knowledge through a rigorous general education program.

With a strong record of success, JMU is well-positioned to move into its second century of excelling in preparing young men and women for the future.



tion systems for critical infrastructure. The Institute for Infrastructure and Information Assurance at JMU was founded as an interdisciplinary research center focusing on homeland and national security issues.

## Citizenship Recognitions

JMU was selected in 2005 by *The Princeton Review* and *Campus Compact* as one of the nation's better colleges for fostering social responsibility and public service. The university is one of 81 institutions, and the only Virginia college, to be featured in the book, *Colleges With A Conscience: 81 Great Schools with Outstanding Community Involvement*, published by Random House/Princeton Review Books.

During spring break in 2008, about 300 JMU students took part in 27 student-led alternative spring break trips to 11 states, the Dominican Republic, Haiti and Nicaragua. The students traveled at their expense and volunteered as tutors, health workers, teachers, cooks, carpenters and laborers at homeless shelters, and community out-reach centers.

After Hurricane Katrina caused massive destruction in Gulf states during the fall of 2005, groups of JMU students, faculty and staff volunteered for several trips to Louisiana and Mississippi to aid in the recovery and cleanup from the storm.





# James Madison University

## Outstanding Facilities & Programs

JMU's commitment to overall excellence extends to its students' living and social environments in the form of a variety of cultural, recreational and entertainment activities.

JMU students also may choose from several styles of on-campus and off-campus housing, and the university's food and dining services are widely acclaimed.

### Housing

Living options range from traditional and modern dormitories to efficiency apartments and townhouses. Each university housing unit is staffed by trained residents who promote hall community.

Chandler Hall in particular is designed to meet students' special needs. It is available to students who are highly qualified academically and provides a unique "living-learning" environment.

### Dining

Students may choose from numerous dining options, and many who reside off campus continue to utilize the variety and convenience of campus dining facilities. Gibbons Dining Hall is JMU's major on-campus dining facility, and it offers several options -- the all-you-can-eat dining hall, Let's Go!, Einstein Bros. Bagels, Market One Food Court and Chick-fil-A.

The primary dining hall features a Fresh Food Company format where customers select from a variety of items that are prepared to order.

Let's Go! is a carry-out option that offers lunch. Einstein Bros. Bagels offers fresh coffee, bagels and much more. Market One Food Court houses several vendors and has a variety of options, including pizza, hamburgers and loaded French Fries, a deli with soup and items to go, and a coffee and smoothie bar.

The University Center offers several options, including a food court at PC Dukes in Phillips Hall, Madison Grill on the fifth floor of Warren Hall, and Java City at Taylor Down Under. PC Dukes offers an extensive menu for eating in or carrying out; Madison Grill offers



sit-down dining; and Java City at Taylor Down Under, which offers a light menu, is a popular attraction featuring a gourmet coffee bar, bagels, and pastries. A second Java City coffee bar is located in JMU's recently constructed CISAT library. On the Phillips Center's second floor is Top Dog Café, Starbucks, Madison Bread Company, GrilleWorks, and Mongolian Grill.

The Dog Pound in Phillips Center is open from 10 p.m.-2 a.m. weeknights, except Monday and Tuesday, and from 8 p.m.-2 a.m. on weekends and features hot dogs, pizza and nachos.

Chandler Hall services the lake area and houses Mrs. Green's and Lakeside Express. Mrs. Green's offers a lunchtime super salad, soup and bread bar, and Lakeside Express features pizza, hot deli sandwiches and specialty items and is open until 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

The Festival Conference and Student Center features a food court area and offers several vendors. Downstairs in the center is a Java City coffee bar and College Store East, a convenience store that includes a smoothie bar. A Freshens Smoothie bar also is located at the university recreation center.

Corner Bistro is located in Memorial Hall and includes a coffee bar and deli.

Another convenience store, Mr. Chips, is located at the center of campus and includes a Quiznos.

### University Center

Like the university's dining options, the number of student activities offered on campus seems limitless. From concerts, films and special entertainers to guest lecturers to numerous organizations and clubs, JMU has activities to interest a variety of students.

The University Center is the base from where many activities originate. JMU has an on-campus theater, and the University Program Board provides activities, including movies, concerts and entertainers, and lecturers. The university sponsors approximately 200 student organizations, and a strong fraternity

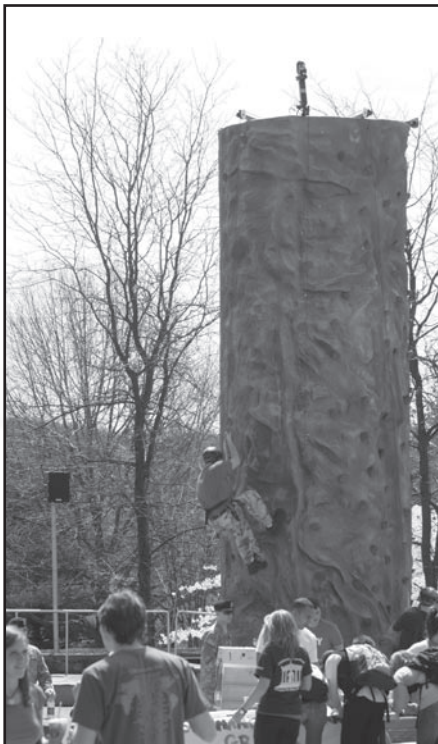
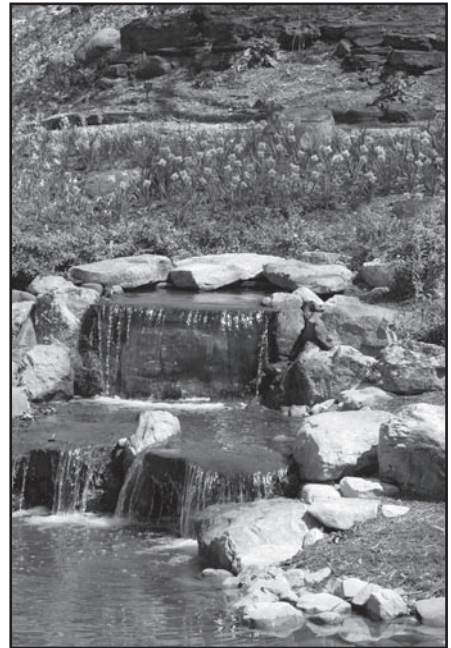
and sorority system is in place on campus.

The University Center includes students' post office boxes, student lounge areas, numerous meeting rooms and areas for a variety of student events. Many of the offices for the university's student activities staff and campus organizations also are located within the facility.

### Recreation Center

A large and modern on-campus recreation facility has added greatly to the list of available activities for JMU students.

The recreation facility includes main and multi-activities gymnasiums, a 25-meter by 25-yard pool, an artificially surfaced outdoor recreation area, an outdoor adventure center, an equipment issue area, locker rooms, an indoor running track, strength-training and fitness areas, an aerobics studio, racquetball courts, a jacuzzi/sauna area, and a pro shop. The recreation center is adjacent to Interstate 81 and is within easy walking distance from JMU's main campus.





# JMU THROUGH THE YEARS

- 1908** – On March 14, Virginia Governor Claude A. Swanson signed the General Assembly bill creating the State Normal and Industrial School for Women at Harrisonburg. Julian Ashby Burruss was named first president of the new school.
- 1909** – The school opened with an enrollment of 150 and a faculty of 15 on a campus of about 50 acres.
- 1910** – The school operated its first summer session -- the first held in Virginia. Male and female students attended.
- 1911** – The first 20 graduates received diplomas.
- 1914** – The school's name was shortened to the State Normal School for Women at Harrisonburg.
- 1916** – Authorization was received for the school to award bachelor's degrees. Previously, only diplomas for post-high school work had been awarded.
- 1919** – Dr. Samuel Page Duke became the institution's second president.
- 1924** – The institution was renamed the State Teachers College at Harrisonburg.
- 1938** – The institution was renamed Madison College in honor of President James Madison. Enrollment passed 1,000.
- 1946** – Men were first enrolled during the regular session but only as day students.
- 1949** – Dr. G. Tyler Miller became the institution's third president.
- 1954** – The college was authorized to award master's degrees.
- 1964** – Enrollment passed 2,000.
- 1966** – The General Assembly approved full coeducational status for the college, and men were enrolled as resident students for the first time.
- 1971** – Dr. Ronald E. Carrier became the institution's fourth president.
- 1972** – Enrollment passed 5,000.
- 1977** – The institution was renamed James Madison University.
- 1983** – JMU celebrated its 75th anniversary.
- 1987** – Enrollment passed 10,000.
- 1995** – JMU began its first doctoral program.
- 1998** – Dr. Linwood H. Rose became the institution's fifth president.
- 2001** – Enrollment reached 15,000, with a full-time faculty and staff of more than 2,000 on a 495-acre campus.
- 2005** – JMU announced plans to purchase the 15.8-acre Rockingham Memorial Hospital site, adjacent to the JMU campus, when the hospital moves to a new site in 2010.
- 2006** – JMU purchased the former Harrisonburg High School and renamed it Memorial Hall.
- 2007-08** – JMU celebrated its Centennial.





## Dr. Linwood H. Rose

President

Dr. Linwood H. Rose became the fifth president of James Madison University in September 1998. Under his leadership, JMU has a well-deserved reputation as one of the top public universities in the nation.

JMU offers a student-centered atmosphere that blends the best attributes of a liberal arts education, including superlative teaching and high levels of service and support, with the best qualities found at larger doctoral universities, including a wide breadth of programs, world-class faculty, state-of-the-art facilities and opportunities for students to be actively involved in research and discovery.

National surveys continue to cite the university's academic excellence and its emphasis on student involvement and civic engagement. JMU has also established itself as a leader in institutional performance measurement, accountability and assessment of student learning.

Founded in 1908, the university recently completed a year-long celebration in honor of the institution's 100th anniversary. Under Dr. Rose's direction, the university community has engaged in numerous planning activities to chart a course for the university's second century, including the creation of a university strategic plan and the appointment of a Presidential Commission to study environmental stewardship and sustainability on the JMU campus.

Central to Dr. Rose's administration have been efforts to diversify and expand JMU's funding portfolio. The university is nearing successful completion of its first comprehensive capital campaign, which has garnered critical funding for scholarships, faculty support, and ongoing support for academic, co-curricular, and capital projects. Also, under Dr. Rose's leadership, JMU's sponsored program activity has expanded significantly and the university developed a strategic partnership with SRI International, a California-based research institute.

Since Dr. Rose became president, a number of major new facilities have been added to the JMU campus and four new doctoral programs have been approved. Dr. Rose also led efforts to align the university more closely with the legacy of President James Madison, the fourth U.S. President and primary author of the U.S. Constitution. JMU is the only university in America named for Mr. Madison.



In addition to his leadership role at JMU, Dr. Rose has represented JMU and Virginia in a variety of important roles on national, regional and state commissions and advisory boards.

President George W. Bush appointed Dr. Rose during the fall of 2002 to the National Infrastructure Advisory Committee. The committee makes recommendations regarding the security of the cyber and information systems of the United States. (JMU is one of seven charter members of the National Security Agency's Centers of Excellence in Information Security Education.)

Dr. Rose was formerly chair of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), the regional accrediting agency for 11 Southern states. He also has served as commissioner, Virginia state chairman, committee chair and executive council member for SACS. In addition, Dr. Rose served as a member of the Division I board of directors of the National Collegiate Athletic Association from 2000-04.

He is a member and former president of the Council of Presidents, an organization of the presidents of Virginia's senior colleges and universities. He serves on boards of directors for the Shenandoah Valley Educational Television Corporation, SunTrust Bank, Harrisonburg and is also a member of the Harrisonburg Downtown Renaissance Advisory Board. He currently serves as the Virginia state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU).

Dr. Rose previously has served as chairman of the board of Rockingham Memorial Hospital, as president and campaign chairman of the Harrisonburg-Rockingham County United Way, and as a member of the James Madison Commemorative Commission of the U.S. Congress.

Dr. Rose began his professional career with JMU in 1975, and his assignments have included responsibilities in every division of the University. He took a leave from the University during the fall of 1985 to serve as Virginia's deputy secretary of education. In 1994 Dr. Rose was promoted to the position of executive vice president. He served as acting president during the fall of 1997 and was tapped to be JMU's chief executive the following September. He was formally inaugurated September 17, 1999.

Dr. Rose grew up in Staunton, Va. He earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Virginia Tech, his master's in educational administration and supervision from the University of Tennessee and his doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Virginia.

Dr. Rose and his wife, Judith, reside at Oakview in Harrisonburg. They have four children and two grandchildren.







## Jeff Bourne

Athletics Director

Jeff Bourne is in his 10th year as JMU's athletics director after working as an administrator in successful programs at Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech for 13 years. At JMU, he directs a program that is competitive within the Colonial Athletic Association and at regional and national levels and that has positioned itself to

continue to play a major role in intercollegiate athletics.

Bourne has overseen recent restructuring to bring JMU's program into full compliance with gender equity guidelines. He also has led plans to help insure the academic success of JMU student-athletes and is coordinating a facilities planning process that will provide the university with outstanding competition and fan venues well into the future.

Under Bourne's leadership, JMU also has developed an enhanced volunteer fundraising network and a point-priority system to recognize donor participation and has implemented programs to increase game attendance and address the needs of athletics infrastructure. A major enhancement of JMU's sports medicine operation has taken place; yearly fundraising totals have increased significantly; and a strategic planning process to enhance the organizational structure of the athletics division is being implemented.

"We're very proud of the accomplishments we've had, and we will continue to take the steps we feel appropriate to allow our programs to be competitive athletically and for our student-athletes to be successful academically," Bourne said. "Our goals are to win conference championships and to advance our teams to post-season play while adhering to NCAA and conference guidelines and to graduate our student-athletes."

"We continue to strengthen the infrastructure and facilities of the athletics program," he said. "Our support centers and athletics personnel are dedicated to providing student-athletes with the best experience possible at the intercollegiate level. We also are extremely pleased with the construction of the Robert and Frances Plecker Athletic Performance Center, which benefits all of our student-athletes with state-of-the-art academic facilities and serves as an entrance and focal point for our football stadium. Other athletics facilities construction that is being planned and implemented on campus -- immediately new baseball and softball stadiums and enhancement of our football facility and later upgrades for other programs -- will provide JMU with outstanding competition sites for years to come."

During Bourne's tenure more than 1,000 conference academic honors have been given to JMU student-athletes, including CAA scholar-athletes, CAA commissioner's academic award winners and ECAC scholar-athletes of the year. JMU also has had four student-athletes receive NCAA post-graduate scholarships.

Perhaps the best measure of team success is the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate. JMU's initial APR of 964 was well above the NCAA minimum standard of 925, and no JMU teams have been subject to APR-related NCAA penalties. Seven of JMU's 18 teams had APR scores ranking in at least the 90th percentile of their respective sports in the NCAA's most-recent APR release.

The Plecker Performance Center, which opened during the spring of 2005, is among the more-significant projects in JMU athletics' history. The

\$10 million facility is adjacent to Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field and features support areas for football and areas for entertaining during home football games and for JMU's athletic hall of fame. Also included is the Challace McMillin Academic Center that benefits performers in all JMU sports programs. Advising and counseling for all of JMU student-athletes take place at the facility, which also includes an outstanding computer lab and strength training and sports medicine facilities.

Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field, the home of JMU's football program, has had a large electronic scoreboard with live game action and video replay capabilities, an outstanding FieldTurf playing surface and an enhanced sound system added in recent years.

The university also has plans to increase the stadium's seating capacity to nearly 25,000 within several years with the addition permanent end zone seating opposite the Plecker Performance Center and the construction of a second deck on the stadium's west side. The current west stands will be rebuilt and also will include club-level seating, private suites and a press box.

JMU during the 2008-09 academic year also will begin construction of a baseball/softball stadium complex adjacent to the university's Memorial Hall, and planning is underway for development of recently acquired university property that eventually may become competition and practice sites for several sports.

Bourne served in several athletics roles at Virginia Tech from 1986-97 and was senior associate athletics director at Georgia Tech from 1997-99. At Georgia Tech, he supervised finance, marketing and promotions, ticketing, sports information, and radio and television broadcasts and production. He also was liaison to the Alexander-Tharpe fund, the university's development arm, and administered baseball and golf.

At Virginia Tech, he was associate athletics director during his final two years, and he co-chaired a committee that reviewed gender equity at the school. The committee developed and implemented a plan that brought the school into compliance with federal guidelines and ranked it fifth nationally in compliance.

A Salem, Va., native, Bourne was Virginia Tech's athletics business manager and then associate athletics director for administration and finance.

Bourne received his Bridgewater College degree in business administration and accounting in 1981 and completed his master's degree in education and sports management at Virginia Tech in 1994. He worked for five years in public accounting and received his certification in public accountancy before moving to Virginia Tech, where he first was an internal auditor and a consultant to the athletic business office. He is a 1994 graduate of the Sports Management Institute Executive Program from the University of North Carolina and the University of Southern California.

Bourne's wife, the former Mary Lou Garber, is a Harrisonburg area native and a Bridgewater graduate. They have two sons -- Jason (19), a JMU student, and Kyle (16).

**Casey Carter**  
Associate Director

Casey Carter, JMU's associate athletics director for student-athlete services, has taught English, Latin and journalism at the high school and college levels. She became JMU's academic coordinator in 1985, established its student-athlete services office and was an advisor in JMU's freshman advising program.

She now directs academic advising and monitoring of NCAA progress toward a degree and continuing academic eligibility, NCAA Life Skills, admissions, housing, JMU's student-athlete advisory council, and the NCAA student-athlete opportunity fund. Her area is also responsible for the academic progress data and graduation success record data that is required of NCAA members.

Carter and her staff also coordinate tutoring, arrange for special academic services and assist in recruiting. They've designed a program to ease the transition by freshmen to college, implemented a career development program for student-athletes, and implemented an orientation class for transfers and a leadership program for selected sophomores. Community service by student-athletes also is coordinated by her staff.

Carter has a bachelor's degree in English and Latin and master's degrees in English and counseling. In 1996 she became an NCAA peer reviewer for Division I athletics certification with areas of expertise in academic integrity, gender and minority equity, and student-athlete welfare.

Previously Carter worked in university relations. She led JMU's cheerleaders to a national title and its dance team and mascot to national honors, wrote grant proposals, created publicity materials and coordinated events for JMU organizations, including the Madisonsians.



**Shelia A. Moorman**  
Associate Director

Shelia Moorman as an associate athletics director supervises eight sport programs and oversees athletics facilities and game operations. She came to JMU as women's basketball coach in 1982 and from 1997 until assuming her current position in June 2004 was JMU's first athletics facilities and events coordinator. She is the division's senior woman administrator and is a member of the Colonial Athletic Association's women's basketball committee.

In 15 basketball years Moorman had a 302-134 record and led JMU to six NCAA Tournaments, including four Sweet 16 trips. She was CAA coach of the year five times and its coach of the decade for 1985-95. Her JMU teams twice in NCAA play beat No. 1 regional seeds (Virginia, 1986; Penn State, 1991), and she is in JMU's athletic hall of fame.

As facilities and events coordinator Moorman directed planning and preparations for home athletics events and for other activities in JMU athletics facilities. She directed game operations and facilities scheduling, supervised JMU's athletics facilities staff, and was the division's liaison for summer sports camp directors.

Moorman was a member of the U.S. National Basketball Team in 1970, 1973 and 1974, an AAU All-America in 1971, 1973 and 1974, and the Missouri Valley AAU Athlete of the Year in 1974. The Jacksonville, Fla., native received her bachelor's degree in physical education from Brigham Young and her master's in exercise physiology and administration from Kansas.



**Geoff Polglase**  
Associate Director

As an associate athletics director Geoff Polglase supervises development, marketing, ticketing, and media relations.

Polglase was assistant to JMU President Linwood H. Rose from 1998-2001, assisting in coordinating activities of the president's office, and from 1994-98 was JMU's alumni relations director and alumni association executive director. While directing the alumni office, he coordinated service to JMU's alumni, expanded office efforts nationwide and increased efforts made with alumni chapters, alumni clubs and class reunions.

A 1985 JMU graduate, Polglase became JMU's alumni chapters director in 1990 and director of alumni constituencies in 1993.

From 1988-90, he was on the University of Richmond staff as director of the Spider Athletic Fund and Programs and led a campaign that raised almost \$500,000. Previously he was coordinator of athletic media relations and marketing.

The Allendale, N.J., native has a master's degree from Ohio State, where he was a graduate assistant to the athletic marketing director. He and his wife, Paula, a 1992 JMU graduate, have three children -- Zach (10), Ben (8) and Sam (5).



**Kevin White**  
Associate Director

Kevin White returned to his alma mater in 2004 and supervises a variety of sports and oversees the strength and conditioning program as an associate athletics director. He also is JMU's liaison to the Colonial Athletic Association's competition committee.

White was a JMU scholarship football player, graduating in 1991 with a sociology and communications degree. He earned his master's in higher education from JMU while working for six years in the athletics division's academic services area as a graduate assistant, academic counselor and the first coordinator of JMU's NCAA Life Skills program.

White was at Florida State from 1997-2004 as an academic adviser and as an assistant director and then associate director of the student-athlete services area. He dealt extensively with the admissions and eligibility processes and initiated and oversaw an operation to assist student-athletes with learning problems, including the hiring of a learning specialist.

The Seat Pleasant, Md., native is married to the former Nora Maguire, who was a JMU lacrosse standout and a member of JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame. They have three sons -- A.C. (8), Austin (6), and Braden (3).







## Tom Kuster

Assistant Director for  
Sports Medicine

In his third year as JMU's assistant athletics director for sports medicine, Tom Kuster oversees the sports medicine and equipment room operations relating to the development and care of all of the university's student-athletes.

Kuster is in his 10th JMU year. He joined the JMU staff as an assistant athletic trainer and has worked directly with several of the athletic programs during his tenure, including men's basketball, baseball, men's and women's gymnastics, and men's and women's soccer. He also has been a clinical instructor and lecturer in JMU's undergraduate athletic training education program. He was the sports medicine staff's assistant director for two years before assuming his current position during the summer of 2006.

Kuster has presented on athletic training related topics at the state, regional, and national level, and he currently serves the Virginia Athletic Trainers' Association as president-elect. He previously served as chairman of VATA's college and university athletic trainer's committee.

Kuster received his bachelor's degree in health sciences with a concentration in athletic training from JMU in 1995 and his master's in athletic training from West Virginia in 1997. He is certified as an athletic trainer through the National Athletic Trainers Association Board of Certification and is acknowledged as a licensed athletic trainer through the Commonwealth of Virginia Board of Medicine. Kuster is also recognized as a performance enhancement specialist through the National Academy of Sports Medicine. He was the head athletic trainer and a lecturer in the sports medicine curriculum at Pfeiffer before joining the JMU staff.



## Jennifer Phillips

Assistant Director for  
Compliance

Jennifer Phillips became JMU's assistant athletics director for compliance in early 2008 and supervises areas of the athletics division relating to rules and guidelines set by the university, the NCAA and conferences in which JMU competes.

Phillips oversees the NCAA compliance program at JMU, coordinates the eligibility and financial aid processes for its student-athletes, and coordinates the athletics division's rules education program regarding compliance issues.

A West Virginia graduate with a business management degree in 1999 and a master's in sports management in 2000, Phillips previously worked as JMU's assistant director of compliance and at Colorado, West Virginia and Gardner-Webb. She was Colorado's compliance/financial aid coordinator from 2000-01 before assuming her first JMU position. She then was West Virginia's assistant director of compliance for two years and was at Gardner-Webb for four years as the assistant athletic director for NCAA compliance.

Phillips and her husband, Steven, have been married for three years and have a daughter, Skylar, who was born in January. She is a native of Romney, W.Va. Steven Phillips, also a West Virginia graduate, received his undergraduate degree in exercise physiology and a master's in athletic coaching education. He was a West Virginia swimming team member and is a native of Parkersburg, W.Va.



## Dr. Roger Soenksen

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Roger Soenksen became JMU's faculty athletics representative for the 2006-07 academic year and in his position serves as a liaison between the university's administration and faculty and the athletics division.

The faculty athletics representative is an independent observer for the university president and assists in ensuring that academic integrity is maintained within the athletics division while looking out for the overall welfare of the student-athletes. In addition to attending student-athlete advisory committee meetings he is an active participant in senior athlete interviews.

Dr. Soenksen, who joined the JMU staff in 1976-77, is a professor who holds a joint appointment in JMU's media arts and design school and communication studies, and his recent teaching assignments have been concentrated in communications law and communications studies.

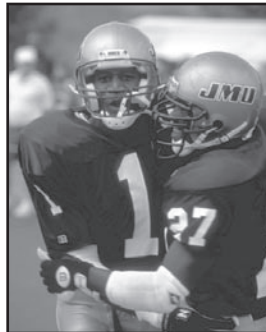

# Colonial Athletic Association Football



The inaugural season of CAA Football kicked off in 2007 with plans to take the nation's premier conference in the Football Championship Subdivision to greater heights, and the mission was accomplished. The league boasted as many as seven teams ranked among the national top 25 during the season, won 15 national player of the week honors and culminated the regular-season success by advancing a record five teams to the NCAA playoff field of 16.

The success did not stop on Selection Sunday. CAA Football came within four points of all five squads advancing to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Championships. Delaware and Richmond moved on to the final four, marking the eighth time in 11 years a CAA squad reached the semifinals.

Delaware logged a semifinal win to earn the league's fourth national final berth in five years while Richmond fell to the eventual national champions. JMU had lost 28-27 in the first round at eventual champion Appalachian State.

The league in 2007 received 67 All-America honors. JMU safety Tony LeZotte became the first player in conference history to earn All-America recognition during every year of his career while New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos left his name among the NCAA's career top three in touchdown passes, passing yards and total offense.

The quality and depth of CAA Football is unmatched in the FCS with 10 of the league's 12 teams having reached the NCAA playoffs during the past seven seasons.

In 2004, JMU won the national championship with a 31-21 triumph over Montana, becoming the first team to reach the title game by winning three road playoff contests. Delaware rolled past Colgate 40-0 for the national title in 2003, becoming the first team to post a shutout in the title game. No other conference has had different teams win national titles in back-to-back years. Massachusetts earned a national crown in 1998, beating Georgia Southern 55-43.

Along with the team accomplishments, the CAA has accumulated numerous individual accolades.

Santos (2006), William & Mary quarterback Lang Campbell (2004), Villanova running back Brian Westbrook (2001), Villanova wide receiver Brian Finneran (1997), New Hampshire running back Jerry Azumah (1998) and Towson running back Dave Meggett (1988) have won the Walter Payton Award.

JMU linebacker Derrick Lloyd received the Buck Buchanan Award in 2001, and New Hampshire's Sean McDonnell (2005), JMU's Mickey Matthews (1999), Villanova's Andy Talley (1997) and Boston University's Dan Allen (1993) have earned the Eddie Robinson Award as the top coach in the FCS.

The CAA Football footprint encompasses much of the East Coast with schools from Maine to Virginia.

Members include Delaware, Hofstra, JMU, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Towson, Villanova, and William & Mary.

While CAA Football officially began March 1, 2007, its roots date back to Dec. 3, 1946, when the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Begun as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont. Upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except football. Delaware and Richmond were admitted in 1986, Villanova in 1988, and JMU, Northeastern and William & Mary in 1993.

The Atlantic 10 took operational control of the conference from 1997-2006, with Hofstra becoming part of the league in 2001 and Towson in 2004.

Since 1978, CAA Football members have accumulated 69 playoff berths, 18 Lambert Cups, 82 final top-25 rankings and 40 final top-10 rankings.

## JMU & The CAA

JMU was a charter member of the CAA in 1985 and also is a member of the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC).

JMU and the CAA's other original members had competed in the ECAC Southern Division, and they retained their ECAC ties while assuming a more-independent role with the formation of a then-eight-member league. CAA members in non-football sports now include JMU, Delaware, Drexel, George Mason, Georgia State, Hofstra, North Carolina Wilmington, Northeastern, Old Dominion, Towson, Virginia Commonwealth, and William & Mary.

The ECAC has more than 250 members from the Middle Atlantic area through New England. Formed in 1938, it assigns officials, administers the affairs of 20 affiliate organizations and manages more than 40 championships annually. Many leagues compete in association with the ECAC, including the CAA, the Atlantic 10, the Big East and the Ivy League.

The CAA has men's championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and wrestling and women's championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

# NCAA Division I Championship Subdivision

In the NCAA's Football Championship Subdivision, JMU competes with approximately 120 teams and is eligible for a 16-team playoff. First-round playoff games are Nov. 29 and the title game Dec. 19 in Chattanooga, Tenn. The first three rounds are at campus sites.

Eight leagues have automatic playoff bids -- the CAA, Big Sky, Gateway, Mid-Eastern, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, and Southland -- and eight spots are filled by at-large entries.

Division I-AA had its first playoff in 1978. The playoffs from 1978-80 included four teams. Eight took part in 1981, and the field went to 12 in 1982 and to 16 in 1986.

This year's title game will be the 12th straight at Chattanooga's Max Finley Stadium/Davenport Field. Current CAA teams have won three national titles there -- JMU in 2004, Delaware in 2003 and Massachusetts in 1998.

ESPN televises the playoffs' semifinal and championship rounds. In 2004 for the first time one semifinal game was played on Friday evening and the other on Saturday afternoon. The title game takes place on Friday evening.

In 2004, current CAA teams JMU, Delaware, New Hampshire, and William & Mary reached the playoffs, and each won a first-round game. JMU and

William & Mary reached the semifinals, where JMU beat the Tribe. A week later the Dukes beat Montana for the NCAA title.

In 2005, league members New Hampshire and Richmond reached the second round. In 2006, JMU, Massachusetts and New Hampshire reached the playoffs, with New Hampshire getting to the second round and Massachusetts to the title game. In 2007 the CAA put a record five teams in the playoffs with Delaware reaching the title game, Richmond the semifinals, Massachusetts the quarterfinals, and JMU and New Hampshire the first-round.

## Lambert Cup/ Meadowlands Trophy

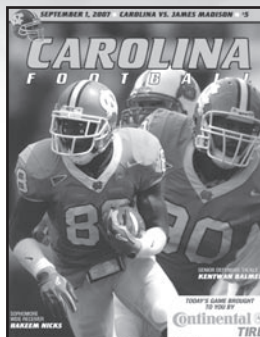

## North Carolina 37, JMU 14 Kenan Stadium Chapel Hill, N.C. -- Sept. 1

T.J. Yates gave North Carolina an early lead with two touchdown passes during the first seven minutes.

Yates threw a 65-yard scoring pass on the third play and a 28-yarder on UNC's third series as the Tar Heels took a 14-0 lead by 8:52 of the first quarter.

Yates hit on 13 of 18 passes overall for 218 yards and three scores and led an offense that had 253 yards by halftime.

In addition to its long early touchdown play, UNC had scores set up by a partially blocked punt, a punt that went only 18 yards, a long interception return of a tipped pass and a blocked punt that was covered at the one.

Yates hit Brooks Foster on a 65-yard touchdown pass on a third-down-and-two play on UNC's first series and Brandon Tate on a 28-yard scoring toss at 8:52 of the opening period on the second play after the Heels partially blocked a punt.

UNC used the 18-yard JMU punt to set up its third score -- Anthony Elzy's two-yard run at the end of a 40-yard series -- and Deunta Williams' 43-yard interception return to the JMU 12 to set up Connor Barth's 27-yard field goal for a 24-0 edge with 13:18 left in the first half.

JMU came back for a 73-yard touchdown drive. Rodney Landers capped the series with a four-yard touchdown pass to L.C. Baker after opening the drive with two completions for 20 yards and running three times during the series for 24 yards.

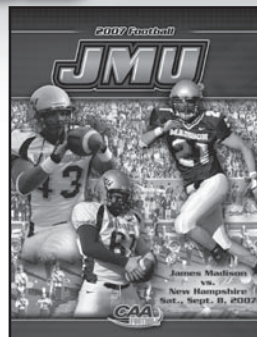

JMU's Rodney Landers ran for 128 yards and two touchdowns and threw for 241 yards and a score.

Landers scored on runs of nine and six yards, hit on 14 of 22 passes, and hit Eugene Holloman on an 11-yard scoring toss. His 369 yards of offense marked for the first time a Duke had reached the 300-yard mark since early 2005.

Landers' nine-yard scoring run came with 0:20 left in the half and pulled JMU into a 17-17 tie. His six-yarder pulled JMU into a 24-24 tie at 6:25 of the third period, and the scoring pass to Holloman put JMU up 31-24 at 1:29 of the third period.

UNH reached the JMU 29 before punting on the next series, and JMU went 79 yards in 10 plays to get an 18-yard Dave Stannard field goal to lead 34-24 lead with 8:30 left.

UNH then reached the JMU 44, but Darrius Ramsey stopped the drive with an interception at the 21. Six plays later Antoine Bolton had a 49-yard scoring run for a 41-24 JMU lead at 4:05.

Richmond scored the first 17 points during JMU's homecoming. The No. 15 Spiders got a field goal on their first series, a touchdown after a fumble recovery at the JMU 10, and a

59-yard touchdown drive to lead 17-0 with 0:40 left in the first half.

JMU scored on a 61-yard pass 0:16 left before halftime and moved into scoring position three times during the final half only to score on a field goal each time.

The No. 6 Dukes reached UR territory again after getting to within 17-16 but were intercepted at the Spider 23 with 0:58 left.

Dave Stannard tied JMU's game record of three field goals and his 36-yarder with 6:00 left got JMU to within 17-16. The Dukes then held UR to one first down and got the ball at their 34 with 2:03 left after a punt and 15-yard fair catch interference penalty.

Rodney Landers hit Rockeed McCarter on a 10-yard pass, Antoine Bolton ran for nine yards, and Landers ran for three yards for a JMU first down at the UR 44 with 1:11 left. But from there, UR's Stephen Howell grabbed a Landers pass.

Stannard's other field goals were from 40 and 39 yards. His 40-yarder came at 13:25 of the third quarter after JMU's Darrius Ramsey recovered a fumble at the UR 23. The 39-yarder came at 7:11 of the third quarter and at the end of a 42-yard drive after a Marcus Haywood interception. The 36-yarder with 6:00 left came on a 50-yard series after JMU stopped UR at the JMU 33.

UR went 70 yards in 17 plays (8:01 of playing time) for its first score, a 21-yard Andrew Howard field goal at 4:59 of the first period. 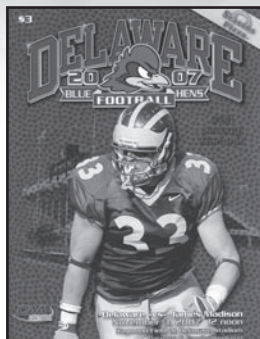

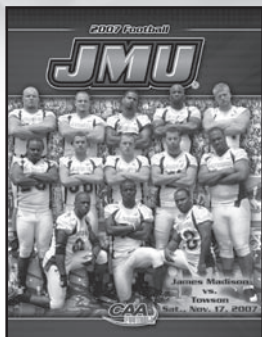

JMU went up to stay on its first offensive series, driving 61 yards in 10 plays for a 36-yard Dave Stannard field goal. Griff Yancey had a 33-yard run and Landers a 19-yarder.

Neither team threatened again until JMU closed the half with its 57-second drive. The Dukes started with 1:18 left, and Landers accounted for all of the series' yardage. He ran four times for 39 yards, including his 18-yard scoring run, and hit on four-straight passes for 47 yards. A 28-yarder to Mike Caussin to the TU 33 was the drive's longest play.

A 21-yard pass from Landers to Yancey and a 15-yard Yancey run to the TU 30 were the keys plays during JMU's final touchdown drive on which Landers scored from the 23.

TU got to within 23-13 on the next series, driving 82 yards. Schaefer hit Marcus Lee on a 16-yard pass to cap the drive after hitting on four of five passes for 58 yards.

Landers had 150 rushing yards, his fifth 100-yard rushing game of 2007, tying JMU's season quarterback mark. He became the first JMU quarterback to run for 1,000 season yards.

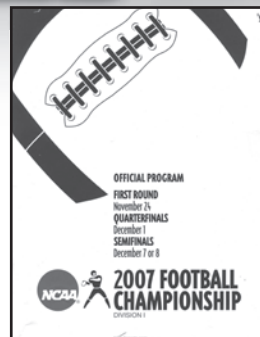

# JMU Football History

## July 17, 1972

Athletic director Dean Ehlers announced that JMU would start football in 1972 and named Challace McMillin head coach. JMU played five games, including two with junior varsity teams and two with military schools. Most of the 1972 team was recruited from the school's fall registration lines.

## Oct. 7, 1972

JMU lost 6-0 to Shepherd's junior varsity in its first game, played on what is now a practice field adjacent

to Godwin Hall. The game was to have been played at Harrisonburg High School but wasn't because of wet conditions. JMU finished 1972 with a 0-4-1 record and without scoring.

## Sept. 22, 1973

JMU posted its first win, 34-8 over Anne Arundel (Md.) Community College at Harrisonburg High School. JMU finished the year 4-5, again playing mostly junior varsity and military teams.

## Sept. 21, 1974

JMU began its first varsity season with a 24-22 win at Washington and Lee.

## Oct. 12, 1974

JMU beat Bridgewater 41-13 in the first game at Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field. An astroturf field had been completed during the 1973-74 school year, and temporary seating was used until 1975.

## 1975

JMU was 9-0-1 with a season-opening scoreless tie at Glenville (W.Va.) its only blemish. JMU won the Virginia College Athletic Association title and won seven straight games by seven or fewer points.

## Sept. 18, 1976

JMU beat Towson 28-26 at home, raising its record to 3-0 and its winning streak to 12 games and earning a tie for first place (with C.W. Post) in the NCAA Division III poll.

## Sept. 25, 1976

JMU played in the first Division III regular-season game televised by a major network (ABC), losing 21-14 at Hampden-Sydney.

## Oct. 16, 1976

JMU won 17-12 at Davidson, its first win over a Division I foe.

## Oct. 14, 1978

JMU's Board of Visitors unanimously approved moving football to Division I. The Board met in Williamsburg, where JMU lost 32-7 to William and Mary in its first game with an in-state Division I foe. JMU went to Division II in 1979 and to

Division I-AA in 1980.

## Nov. 11, 1978

JMU won 42-12 at Emory and Henry to finish the year 8-2 and ranked ninth nationally in Division III.

## Dec. 18, 1978

JMU announced it would offer 25 scholarships in 1979. Quarterback Frankie Walker and fullback Joe Curro, transfers from Lees-McRae (N.C.) College, were announced as JMU's first scholarship signees Jan. 17, 1979.

## 1982

JMU was 8-3 and appeared in the Division I-AA top 20 poll for seven straight weeks, reaching ninth midway through the season. JMU defeated Virginia 21-17 in Charlottesville (Sept. 18), the Dukes' first win over a Division I-A opponent.

## Jan. 4, 1984

Wide receiver Gary Clark became the first JMU player drafted by a professional football team when Jacksonville made him its first choice (sixth pick overall) in the United States Football League draft. Jacksonville was an expansion team, and he was its initial draft choice.

## Dec. 20, 1984

Joe Purzycki became JMU's second head coach, replacing Challace McMillin.

## April 29, 1986

Linebacker Charles Haley, JMU's initial Division I-AA first-team All-America, became the first Duke selected in the National Football League draft (fourth round, San Francisco).

## 1987

JMU enjoyed its most successful scholarship season to date, going 9-3 and reaching the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the first time. JMU was nationally ranked for nine straight weeks and was ranked as high as third.

## Dec. 14, 1990

Rip Scherer became JMU's third head coach, replacing Joe Purzycki.

## 1991

The 9-4 Dukes reached the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the first time. They were nationally ranked for nine straight weeks, and they beat four nationally ranked opponents, three on the road.

## 1993

JMU first played in the Yankee Conference after joining the league in 1991.

## 1994

JMU set a team record for wins (10-3 record) and reached the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs for the second time. JMU was nationally ranked for 10 of the regular-season's last 11 weeks and beat four of five ranked foes it faced.

## Jan. 23, 1995

Alex Wood became JMU's fourth head coach, replacing Rip Scherer, who became head coach at Memphis.

## 1995

The 8-4 Dukes returned to the playoffs for the second straight year and were nationally ranked in every poll during the season by The Sports Network.

## 1997

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference assumed the Yankee Conference's operations

## March 19, 1999

Mickey Matthews became JMU's fifth head coach. He was introduced at a March 22 press conference, and he succeeded Alex Wood, who resigned March 15 to accept a coaching assistant's position with the NFL's Minnesota Vikings.

## 1999

JMU tied for the Atlantic 10 title, its first Division I crown, and returned to the NCAA playoffs. Mickey Matthews was the Division I-AA coach of the year by The Sports Network; Curtis Keaton was the Atlantic 10 offensive player of the year and a fourth-round draft choice by the Cincinnati Bengals; and Chris Morant was the Atlantic 10 defensive player of the year.

## 2000

JMU's Delvin Joyce became the first Division I-AA player to reach the 1,000-yard career mark in each of the statistical categories of rushing (1,260), receiving (1,009), kickoff returns (1,902) and punt returns (1,488).

## 2001

JMU linebacker Derrick Lloyd won the Buck Buchanan Award, sponsored by The Sports Network, as Division I-AA's top defensive player.

## June 6, 2003

Ground was broken on the on the Robert and Frances Plecker Athletic Performance Facility adjacent to Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field.

## 2004

JMU won the NCAA Division I-AA national title by beating Montana 31-21 Dec. 17 in Chattanooga, Tenn. The 13-2 Dukes set a team record for wins and became the first Division I-AA team to win three road playoff games during the same season. Mickey Matthews was Division I-AA coach of the year by the American Football Coaches Association.

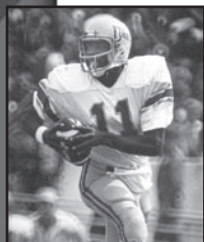
## 2006

The 9-3 Dukes made their second playoff appearance in three seasons and were nationally ranked in every poll during the season by The Sports Network, including in the top 10 in the final seven polls.

## 2007

The Colonial Athletic Association assumed the Atlantic 10's operations.

The 8-4 Dukes made their third NCAA playoff appearance in four seasons and were nationally ranked in every poll during the season by The Sports Network and the FCS coaches.

## An Excellent Tradition

JMU winning the NCAA Division I-AA national title in 2004 is the high point in team history and demonstrates the remarkable growth the program has enjoyed since its inception in 1972.

Now under their fifth head coach, the Dukes have gone from a non-scholarship team recruited through registration lines to a program that has reached the top of the NCAA Championship Subdivision, from playing at a local high school to competing at on-campus Bridgeforth Stadium/Zane Showker Field with an adjoining state-of-the-art support facility, from playing junior varsity and military school teams to competing in the nation's top FCS league, the Colonial Athletic Association.

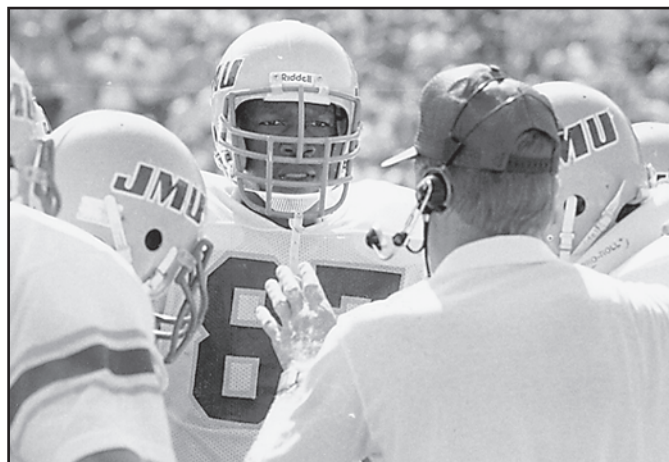
JMU has played in the NCAA playoffs seven times since 1990 and eight times overall, beginning in 1987. Several former Dukes have had prominent careers in the National Football League.

## Rapid Development

Football began at JMU in 1972, and in 1975 the Dukes were 9-0-1. They were ranked atop the Division III poll in 1976, by 1979 gave scholarships and in 1980 began competing in Division I-AA. After facing few varsity teams for two years, JMU had games with Division I-A foes Virginia and Virginia Tech in 1979 and 1980. Under Coach Challace McMillin, the Dukes in 1982 beat Virginia on its home field in what always will be one of the more-memorable games in team history.

JMU continued climbing in Division I-AA and reached the NCAA playoffs in 1987 during a 9-3 year under Coach Joe Purzycki. Coach Rip Scherer led the Dukes to the playoffs in 1991 and 1994, and Coach Alex Wood and Coach Mickey Matthews led them to post-season play in 1995 and 1999. All three were in their first years as head coaches during their first playoff appearances. Matthews' 2004 national championship team made history by becoming the first Division I-AA team to win three road playoff games in a season, and his teams were back in post-season play in 2006 and 2007.

While ranked as the co-No. 1 team in the nation in 1976, JMU played in the first Division III game televised by a major network (at Hampden-Sydney). From early in 1975 until early in 1976 JMU put together a 12-game winning streak and an unbeaten run of 13 games.

## Long List of Heros

The names of professional standouts Scott Norwood, Gary Clark and Charles Haley are most often mentioned in discussions of JMU football history, but the program's first 36 years have produced numerous standouts.

Quarterback Les Branich and offensive lineman Jeff Adams were early cornerstones and the only players to letter during each of the program's first four years. Defensive lineman Woody Bergeria and linebacker Dewey Windham received early All-America honors, and tailbacks Ron Stith and Bernard Slayton compiled remarkably similar statistics during standout careers from 1973-76. Both are members of JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame, as are Bergeria and Branich.

Bergeria and Windham were leaders on the 1975 team that allowed only 75 points, gave up more than seven points in only three of 10 games and shut out three foes. While sharing tailback duties, Stith ran for 2,308 career yards and Slayton for 2,161, and they still are in the top 10 on JMU's career rushing yards list. They combined to run for 44 career touchdowns.

Linebacker Dale Caparaso had three of the top season-tackle totals in team history from 1976-79, and quarterback John Bowers threw for 1,169 yards and four touchdowns and ran for four scores to lead the Dukes to an 8-2 record and a No. 9 national ranking in 1978, their final Division III year. Offensive guard Rick Booth was a 1978 All-America.

## Transition Period

The move to a scholarship program was challenging, but the period produced some of JMU's top performers. Norwood enrolled in 1978 and became one of

I-AA's top placekickers; Clark arrived in 1980 and gave JMU its best receiver-kick returner combination; and Haley and Warren Marshall, the team's career rushing leader, arrived in 1982. All four are in JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame. Marshall, with 4,168 career rushing yards, completed his career as the top rusher in Virginia college history, and he had a team career-record 20 100-yard rushing games.

Clyde Hoy led JMU in tackles in 1980 and 1981 and finished his career with 503 stops. Offensive linemen John Kent and John Blackwell were All-Americans in 1982 and 1983, respectively, and Haley in 1985 was JMU's first Associated Press first-team I-AA All-America. In 1986 Haley, JMU's career tackles leader (506), became its first NFL draftee (San Francisco, fourth round), and he was the first player to be a member of five winning Super Bowl teams.

JMU's 21-17 win at Virginia in 1982 came only three years after the Dukes lost 69-9 there and was the springboard to an 8-3 year, JMU's first winning I-AA season. Quarterback Jon Roddy came off the bench to rally the Dukes by Appalachian State in their second 1982 game (39-35 win) and combined with Clark on an 80-yard scoring pass the next week at Virginia. Mike Thurman returned an interception 53 yards for a score at Virginia.

Clark had punt returns of 87 and 89 yards for scores in JMU's 1983 game at Virginia before the hosts rallied for a 21-14 win. Clark was the sixth player selected in the 1984 United States Football League draft, and after two USFL seasons he joined the Washington Redskins and played for two Super Bowl winners.

### Division I-AA Success

A defense that ranked in the top 20 in I-AA for six straight years under Purzycki and defensive coordinator Jim Pletcher, who remained at JMU through 1994, was the Dukes' trademark in the late 1980s and a key ingredient in the team's 9-3 playoff season in 1987. JMU allowed fewer than 300

yards per game in every season from 1985-90, including 1987 when it gave up 291.7 yards per game. Linebacker Marty Fitzgerald led the 1987 defense with 128 tackles, and the Dukes were ranked as high as third nationally.

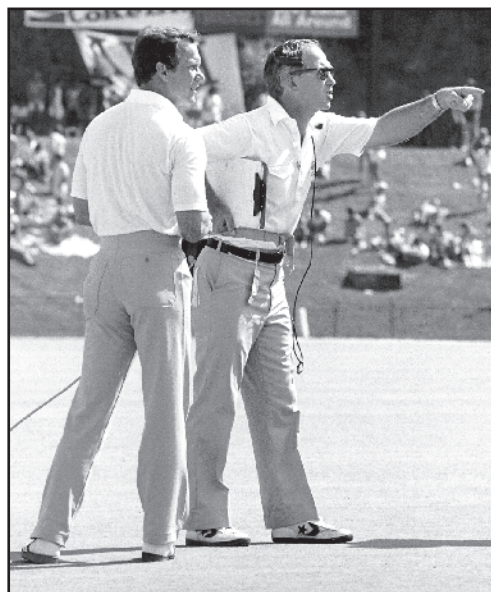
Defenders Shawn Woodson, Steve Bates and Dan Kobosko were key performers in the late 1980s, and offensive guard Carlo Bianchini and punter John Druett also received All-America honors. Safety Eupton Jackson was named to four All-America first teams in 1990, and offensive tackle D.R. Carlson was an All-America that season.

JMU won at I-A Navy in 1989 and 1990 before Scherer, a former offensive coordinator at Arizona and later the head coach at Memphis, led the Dukes to the playoffs in 1991. That 9-4 squad had JMU's first playoff win -- 42-35 in double overtime at Delaware -- and set a then-team record by averaging 31.9 points behind quarterback Eriq Williams and tailback Kenny Sims.

The 1991 team lost its opener at I-A Virginia Tech but then in consecutive games beat nationally ranked opponents in 1990 playoff participant Central Florida 49-31, eventual Southern Conference winner Appalachian State 31-8 on the road, and 1990 playoff participant William & Mary 29-28 on the road.

JMU won at defending I-AA champion Youngstown State (52-49) in 1992 and returned to the playoffs in 1994 and 1995 behind most valuable player Mike Cawley. The 1994 squad became JMU's then-winningest team (10-3), had a playoff win and won the Lambert/Meadowlands Cup as the top I-AA squad in the East.

The 1995 team was 8-4, went to the playoffs and gave the Dukes the then-best back-to-back years in team history. JMU completed 1995 having been ranked in 23 straight I-AA top-25 polls by The Sports Network (22 times in the top 20, 10 times in the top 10).



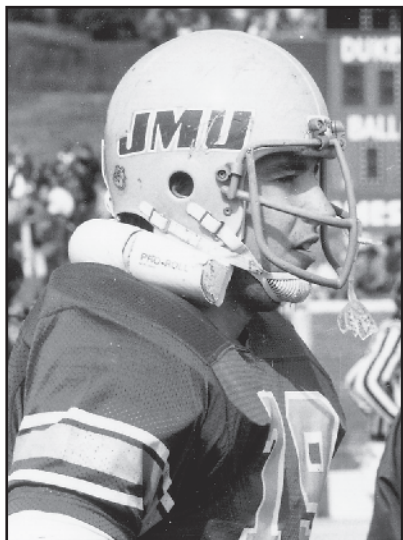
Coach Challance McMillin (pointing) with assistant Jimmy Prince at JMU's 1983 game at Appalachian State

The Dukes in 1999 tied for the Atlantic 10 title, JMU's first I-AA title, and returned to post-season play. JMU met I-A national runner-up Virginia Tech in its opener and then won seven straight games behind Matthews, The Sports Network's I-AA coach of the year. Matthews also was the A-10 coach of the year, and JMU's Curtis Keaton and Chris Morant were the league's offensive and defensive players of the year. The A-10 honors were JMU's first, and Keaton was selected in the fourth round of the NFL draft by Cincinnati. The season was the first time one program received each of the league's three major awards during the same year.

yards and became the first Duke since 1992 and only the then-third overall to run for 1,000 yards (Marshall had three 1,000-yard years and Sims two). In 1999 Keaton set JMU season records of 1,719 rushing yards, 20 rushing scores, 21 overall touchdowns, 126 points and 2,024 all-purpose yards. He played in the NFL with Cincinnati and New Orleans.

Joyce broke the team record for all-purpose yards in each of his first two years with the Dukes. In combined rushing, receiving and return efforts, Joyce had 1,563 yards in 1997 and 1,741 in 1998. Jay Jones set the previous team-season all-purpose yards mark of 1,515 yards in 1996 when he also set a national I-AA mark by returning kickoffs for 268 yards in a 31-27 win at Richmond.

The Dukes in 1998 also got a team-season-record 82 receptions from Earnest Payton, who as a 2000 senior broke McLeod's team career receptions record (185).

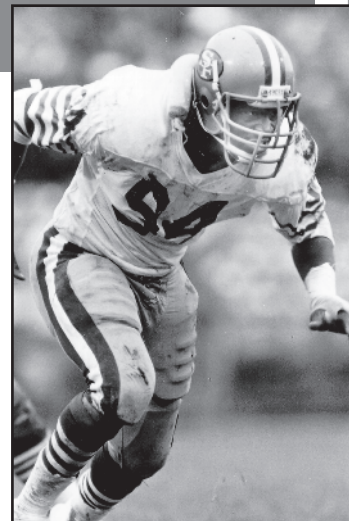
Joyce in 2000 became the first I-AA player to reach the 1,000-yard career mark in each of the categories of rushing (1,260), receiving (1,009), kickoff returns (1,902) and punt returns (1,488). He also set JMU records for career all-purpose yards (5,659), punt return yards, kickoff return yards and combined kick return yards (3,390), and he established I-AA career marks for punt return and combined kick return yards. Joyce played with the NFL's New York Giants.

Pack was the A-10's regular-season tackles leader twice. He took part in more than 400 tackles as a Duke, was a three-time first-team All-A-10 choice, and signed with the St. Louis Rams.

Lloyd led the nation in unassisted tackles as a 2001 senior and won The Sports Network's Buck Buchanan Award as I-AA's top defensive player after finishing the year with 157 stops overall, 7.5 quarterback sacks and five fumble recoveries.

LeZotte was the A-10's co-rookie of the year in 2004 when he had a team-freshman-record 144 stops as the national champions' tackles leader, and he was the league defensive player of the year in 2005 and 2007 and its first player to receive All-America honors for four seasons.

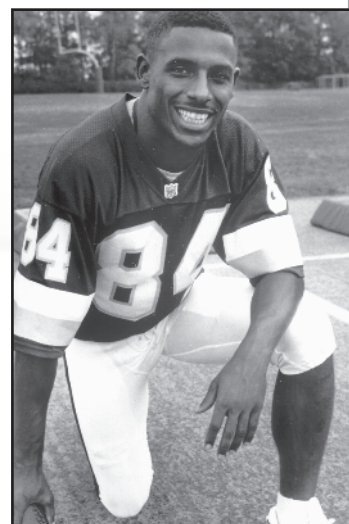
In 2006 Akeem Jordan was runner-up for the Buck Buchanan Award as the nation's top defender and won College Sporting News national defender of the year award, and he became a starter with the Philadelphia Eagles in 2007.

## Continuing Success

Cawley (6,482 passing yards in three years) erased many of Williams' (5,356 career passing yards, team-record 7,678 yards of total offense) passing records while safety Chris Parrott, defensive tackle Tyrone Washington, cornerback Dwight Robinson, center David Bailey, placekicker John Cousey, tight end Ed Perry, wide receiver David McLeod, safety Tony Booth, return specialist Delvin Joyce, Keaton, Morant, linebackers Derrick Pack and Derrick Lloyd, offensive lineman Matt Magerko, free safety Tony LeZotte, safety Rodney McCarter, linebacker Kwynn Walton, offensive tackle Corey Davis,

linebacker Akeem Jordan, and defensive end Kevin Winston have received more-recent All-America honors.

Cawley threw for 42 touchdowns, and Williams in four years threw for 40 scores and ran for a team-career-record 32. Sims had consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons in 1991 and 1992 and had five straight 100-yard rushing games in 1991.

McLeod erased most of Clark's JMU receiving records and had 158 career catches for 2,899 yards and 21 touchdowns. Macey Brooks had a team-record 14 scoring catches in 1996, and he was drafted by Dallas and Perry by Miami the next spring. Perry was a three-time first-team all-league choice.

Booth was first-team All-America in 1997 and 1998 and was drafted by Carolina. He had a JMU-record eight interceptions in 1997 to rank second nationally and had 122 tackles, the then-third most by a JMU defensive back and the most by any Duke since 1989.

Booth had a team-high 106 tackles in 1998 when JMU also got a standout year from Keaton. In his first JMU year, Keaton ran for 1,064

## Super Bowl Spotlight

Former JMU players have made nine Super Bowl appearances and have been members of the winning team seven times.

Haley, who had a JMU-record 506 career tackles, played on Super Bowl winners with San Francisco (two) and Dallas (three). Clark played on two title teams with Washington, and Norwood made two title game appearances with Buffalo.

## Conference Affiliation

JMU was an independent during its early I-AA years but joined the Yankee Conference in 1991 and began competing in the league in 1993.

The Yankee schools affiliated with the A-10 in 1997 and the Colonial Athletic Association in 2007, and they long have comprised one of the nation's top leagues. In 1998 member Massachusetts won the I-AA title, and Delaware in 2003 and JMU in 2004 gave the league consecutive crowns. The league has gotten had multiple playoff bids for 17 straight seasons, had four first-round winners in the 2004 playoffs and sent a record five teams to the postseason in 2007.

## Former JMU Coaches

McMillin, who coached JMU for its first 13 football seasons (1972-84), remained affiliated with the university. He completed doctoral studies and was a JMU kinesiology faculty member until retirement. He has been inducted into JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame and continues to work at JMU in a sports psychology role.

Purzycki (1985-90) has been a banking and business executive in Wilmington, Del.; Scherer (1991-94) left JMU to become the head coach at Memphis; and Wood (1995-98) left JMU to become the quarterbacks coach with the NFL's Minnesota Vikings. Scherer has coached at Southern Mississippi and Kansas and has been on the staff of the Cleveland Browns, and Wood later was on the coaching staffs of the Cincinnati Bengals and Arizona Cardinals and recently was quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Arkansas.



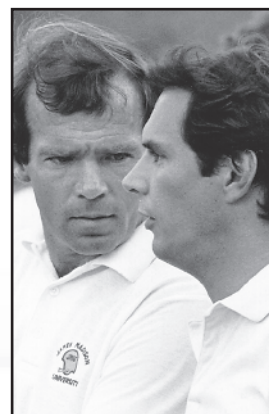

## Dukes Make History

### With 2004 NCAA Title Run



James Madison University football in 2004 made history at the team and national levels.

The 13-2 Dukes won the NCAA Division I-AA title with a playoff effort that became increasingly impressive as the postseason progressed. JMU took the national crown without hosting a playoff game, becoming the first Division I-AA team to win three playoff road contests in a season.

JMU won with depth and balance, consistent play that included Division I-AA's second-ranked run defense (86.8 yards per game), good special teams play, and an offense that developed a powerful running attack and avoided mistakes. The Dukes won seven games by 10 or fewer points and were particularly effective late in contests.

JMU won 17-0 at Villanova after a scoreless first 36 minutes and beat Massachusetts 28-7 after a scoreless first 40 minutes. The Dukes won 24-20 at Maine with a touchdown with 0:48 left and beat Delaware 20-13 with an 87-yard punt return for a score with 3:04 left and by stopping the Hens after they had a first-down-and-goal situation from the three during the next drive.

After tying for the Atlantic 10 title (7-1 record), JMU was disappointed not to get a home playoff game. However, the Dukes responded with a 14-13 first-round win at Lehigh and then won by the same score at Furman, driving 74 yards during the final 5:11 for the decisive touchdown.

JMU avenged its lone Division I-AA loss of the year by winning 48-34 at William & Mary in a nationally televised (ESPN) Friday night game and beat Montana 31-21 for the NCAA title the following Friday in Chattanooga, Tenn., before another national television audience.

The Dukes took a 21-0 lead at William & Mary, fell behind 26-21 early in the second half, and then dominated play with 28 straight points in an 18-minute period.

JMU was equally effective during the last three quarters against Montana, running for 314 yards overall and holding the ball for 36:13 of the game's 60 minutes.

JMU's play helped Mickey Matthews gain Division I-AA coach of the year honors from the American Football Coaches Association, and several Dukes received major awards.

Offensive guard Matt Magerko and free safety Tony LeZotte led the award recipients. Magerko was first-team All-America by Associated Press, and LeZotte was first-team by I-AA.org, second team by Associated Press and *Football Weekly* and third-team by The Sports Network. Linebacker Kwynn Walton was third-team All-America by The Sports Network, and safety Rodney McCarter was a Football Foundation All-America. LeZotte was the Atlantic 10 co-rookie of the year.

Tailback Raymond Hines was team MVP after running for 1,038 yards. He became a starter at midseason when Alvin Banks and Maurice Fenner were hurt and became only the fourth Duke to run for 1,000 yards during a season. Fenner (117 yards at William & Mary, 164 vs. Montana) and Banks (88 yards vs. Montana) stepped back into the spotlight for the final two playoff games after Hines was hurt at William & Mary.

Quarterback Justin Rascati threw for 2,045 yards and 14 touchdowns, ran for 10 scores, and was intercepted only five times in 283 passes.

Team defensive MVP Trey Townsend and Walton as linebackers, LeZotte, and McCarter led the defense. LeZotte set a team freshman record with 144 tackles, Townsend had 102 tackles and five interceptions, McCarter had 92 stops, and Walton had 88 tackles.

Cornerback Clint Kent, who had 73 tackles for the season, returned an interception 69 yards for a score at William & Mary and sealed JMU's title-game win over Montana with an interception.





## 2004 Playoffs

### JMU 14, Lehigh 13

Nov. 27, 2004 ~ Bethlehem, Pa.

Justin Rascati and Raymond Hines ran for first-half scores, and JMU got solid defense in taking its first step toward the Division I-AA title.

Rascati scored on a nine-yard scramble during JMU's first series, and Hines ran one yard for a score during the second period. JMU led 14-10 at halftime, allowed Lehigh but 114 second-half yards, and set a team game record with 11 sacks. Hines ran 29 times for 191 yards.

JMU went 91 yards in 14 plays for a score on its first series. Hines started the drive with a 17-yard carry, and Rascati hit on seven of nine passes for 69 yards.

LU got to within 7-3 on its third series on a 43-yard field goal by Matt McNelis and went up 10-7 at 7:40 of the second quarter when Eric Rath capped a 54-yard drive with a six-yard run.

JMU went up 14-10 on Hines' one-yard run on its next series. He set up the score with a 43-yard run to the LU one, and JMU had the ball for 6:39 and went 65 yards in 14 plays.

LU got to within 14-13 on McNelis' 28-yard field goal at 3:55 of the third quarter. The Hawks scored after getting the ball at the JMU 39 when JMU didn't convert on a faked punt try.

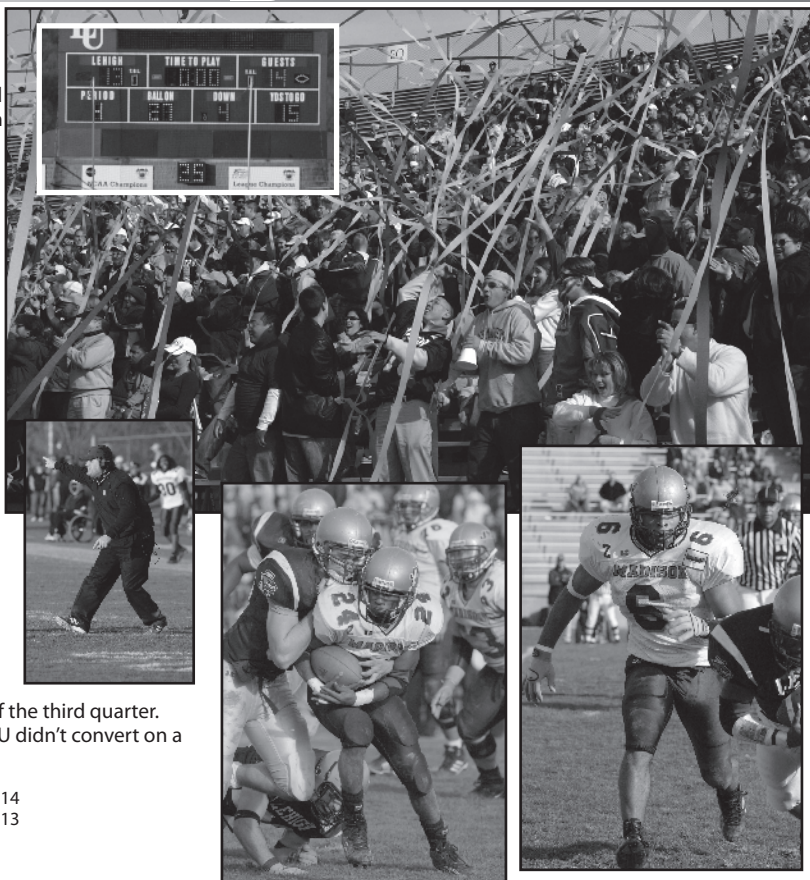
JMU got the ball at its 26 after Demetrius Shambley blocked a 43-yard field goal try. A holding penalty put JMU at its 16, but the Dukes scored in 12 plays. Justin Rascati had passes of 16 and 11 yards to D.D. Boxley and hit Nic Tolley for 26 yards, L.C. Baker for 15 and Ardon Bransford for 14 to the Furman eight. Hines then scored on fourth down.

Rascati hit on five of six passes for 78 yards during the drive and on 16 of 22 tries for 176 yards overall. Hines had both scores for JMU which overcame two lost fumbles and nine penalties.

JMU scored first on a five-yard Hines run at 11:09 of the second quarter after getting the ball at the FU eight on Isaiah Dottin-Carter's blocked punt.

FU tied the game at 7-7 on a 74-yard drive. Jerome Felton scored from the one after FU got a first down at the five when JMU twice was flagged for offsides as FU set up field goal tries. FU went up 13-7 at 12:55 of the third period after a JMU fumble at its 17 but missed on the PAT try.

JMU got 27 straight points after William & Mary overcame a 21-0 deficit to lead 26-21 during the opening series of the last half. The Dukes got 28 points after turnovers, scored twice during a two-minute span later in the third quarter, and sealed the win with a drive that used 8:36 of playing time to lead 48-26 with 8:01 left.

Maurice Fenner ran 29 yards to the WM 34 on the first play after JMU fell behind, and D.D. Boxley made a diving end zone catch of a Justin Rascati pass on the next play for a 27-26 JMU lead at 11:00 of the third period.

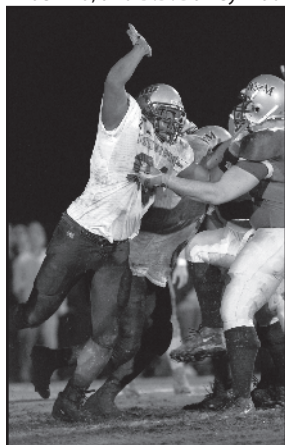
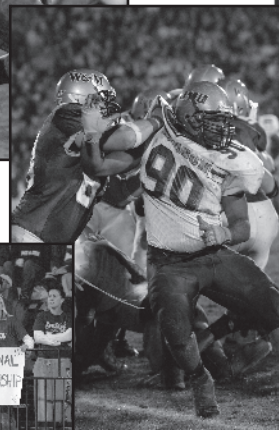
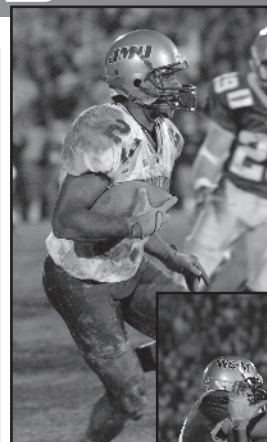
Bruce Johnson recovered a fumble four plays later at the WM 48, and Chris Iorio's four-yard run ran the lead to 34-26. JMU got the ball on Demetrius Shambley's recovery at the WM 18 on the next play, and a 13-yard pass from Rascati to Antoine Bolton ran the lead to 41-26.

JMU put together a 15-play, 58-yard scoring drive to lead 48-26 on Alvin Banks' one-yard run.

JMU went 73 yards in six plays for a TD on the game's first series and scored after WM fumbled a punt and on Clint Kent's 69-yard interception return to lead 21-0 at 4:02 of the first period.

WM, with Lang Campbell hitting on 17 straight passes, scored on four straight series to get to within 21-20 by halftime and went 73 yards in seven plays to start to final half for its only lead.

### JMU 31, Montana 21

Dec. 17, 2004 ~ Chattanooga, Tenn.

JMU won the national title with a stingy defense and a strong running game. The Dukes allowed a first-quarter TD for the only time in 2004 and trailed twice before dominating the final minutes.

JMU went up to stay 24-21 on a one-yard Maurice Fenner run at 3:25 of the third quarter, added Justin Rascati's six-yard run for a score with 8:00 left, and ran the final 6:14 off the clock. The Dukes used 14 straight rushing plays to kill the clock at the end of the game and nine straight runs during the 72-yard drive that put them up to stay. JMU ran for 314 yards, 257 during the last half.

In addition to the score that put JMU up to stay, Fenner scored on a one-yard run late in the first period for a 10-7 JMU edge. Rascati ran 11 yards for a score on JMU's first third-quarter series.

JMU's effort off set a strong outing by Montana's Craig Ochs, who threw for 371 yards and three scores. However, the Grizzlies had only 44 rushing yards.

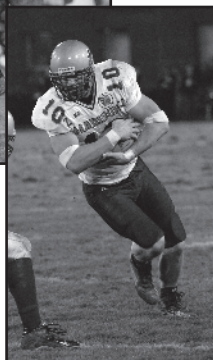
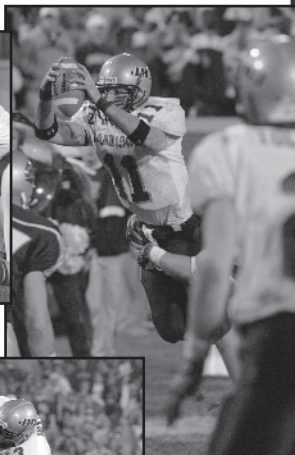

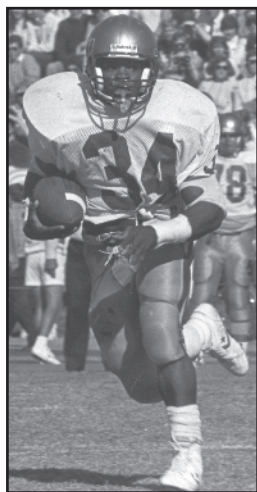

Peterson hit on 22 of 34 passes, and the Herd compiled 499 total yards to JMU's 281.

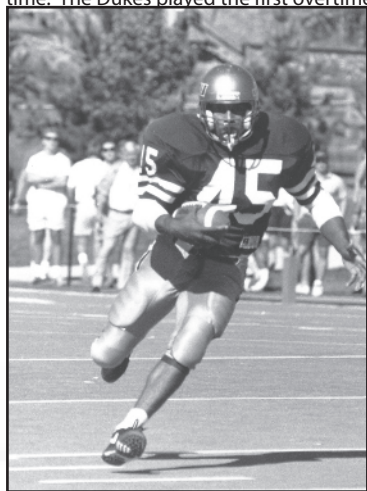

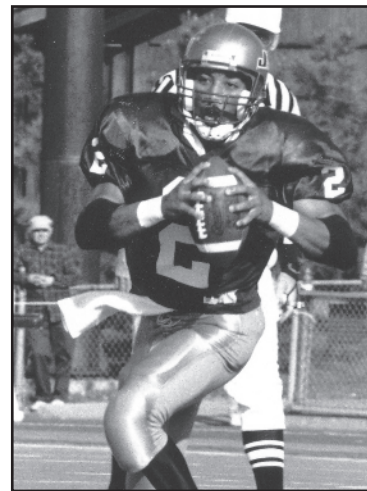
## Samford 24, JMU 21 Dec. 7, 1991 ~ Harrisonburg, Va.

Kelvin Jeter ran 25 times for a career-high 240 yards and three touchdowns, and JMU compiled 572 yards of total offense in its first home playoff victory. Jeter had the then-third-best game rushing effort in team history and scored on a six-yard run during opening quarter for the game's first points, on a 30-yard run for a 31-13 JMU lead in the third quarter, and on a 43-yard run with 1:50 remaining for the game's final points.

JMU took a 10-0 lead after less than seven minutes, but Troy State pulled into a 10-10 tie midway through the second quarter before Mike Cawley's 38-yard scoring pass to Macey Brooks put JMU in front to stay with 5:01 left in the half. Cawley hit Ed Perry on a 14-yard touchdown pass, and Jeter had his 30-yard scoring run to raise the Dukes' edge to 31-13 during the third quarter.

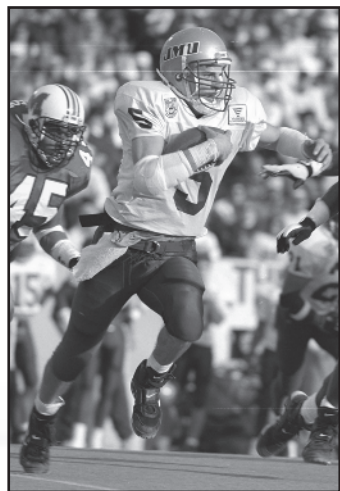

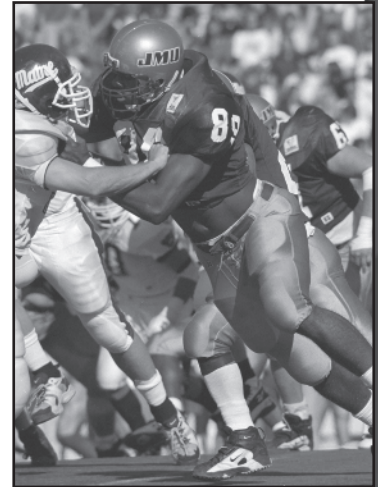
### Appalachian State 31, JMU 24 Nov. 25, 1995 ~ Boone, N.C.

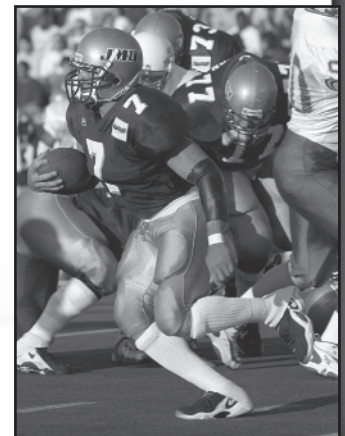

The Trojans drove 75 for a touchdown on the first series of the second half and scored again with 8:57 left in the third quarter after returning an inter- ception to the Dukes' one.

Quarterbacks Charles Berry and John DeFilippo weren't on the team's travel roster because of injuries.

The Penguins then put together a 13-play, 88-yard series that ended in Marcus Mason's one-yard scoring run with 1:12 left. Zetts had a 30-yard pass on third and 15 from the YSU seven and threw for 52 yards during the drive.

JMU then got one first down and reached the YSU 46 but had three straight incompletions and Rascati gained only eight yards on fourth down.

YSU drove 84 yards to score on the first series, but Scotty McGee returned the ensuing kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown to pull JMU into a 7-7 tie.

YSU went up 10-7 on a 40-yard field goal at 5:51 of the first quarter after moving 49 yards in nine plays, but JMU took a 14-10 lead at 2:26 of the period on an 11-yard Rascati scoring run at the end of a 70-yard series.

YSU went up on a four-yard option pass from Monquantae Gibson to Rory Berry with 11:43 left in the half and 20-14 on a 26-yard field goal with 0:52 left in the half.

JMU got to within 20-17 at halftime on David Rabil's 37-yard field goal as time ran out and scored on its second and third series of the final half to lead 31-20.

JMU compiled 394 total yards (249 rushing, 145 passing) and YSU 412 (94 rushing, 318 passing). Rascati hit on 14 of 24 passes for 145 yards and ran for 93 yards for JMU. Zetts hit on 24 of 40 passes for 314 yards, and Peterson had 11 receptions for 144 yards for YSU.

JMU scored on its first series, going 73 yards after Marcus Haywood's fumble recovery. Landers hit Griff Yancey on a 10-yard touchdown pass at 10:12 of the first quarter.

ASU tied the score after Jacque Roman returned a JMU fumbled pass reception 77 yards to the one. Edwards scored after JMU used 17 plays to go from its 11 to the ASU 23.

JMU went up 14-7 on Yancey's five-yard run, but ASU got to within 14-13 with 5:47 left in the half on an 80-yard march that included a 41-yard Edwards run.

ASU went up 19-14 with 3:09 left in the half. ASU got the ball at the JMU 27 after it bounced off a JMU receiver who was hit as the ball arrived. Edwards ran 18 yards to the one on fourth and two and scored on the next snap.

An Adam Ford fumble recovery at the ASU 43 set up a drive that gave JMU a 20-19 lead at 4:29 of the third quarter. Placekicker Dave Stannard scored from the seven, taking a pitch after JMU lined up a field goal.

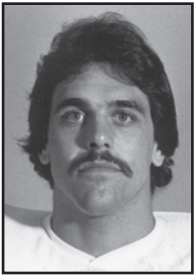

Signed as an NFL free agent defensive lineman with New England... Later was with British Columbia of the Canadian Football League and Houston and Cleveland of the NFL.

### Gary Clark

(1980-83)

An eight-year standout with the Washington Redskins after playing two seasons with the USFL Jacksonville Bulls, who made him their 1984 first-round draft choice... Later played with Arizona and Miami and had 699 NFL receptions, including 65 for touchdowns... Had five 1,000-yard receiving seasons and played in four Pro Bowls... Caught 155 passes for 2,863 yards and 16 touchdowns at JMU and was the 1983 Virginia Division I offensive player of the year... In 1983 at Virginia had punt returns of 89 and 87 yards for touchdowns... Member of JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame and his JMU number (80) is retired.

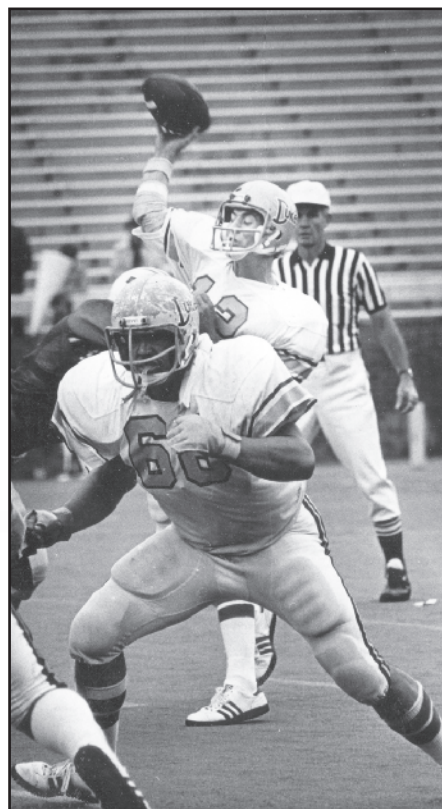

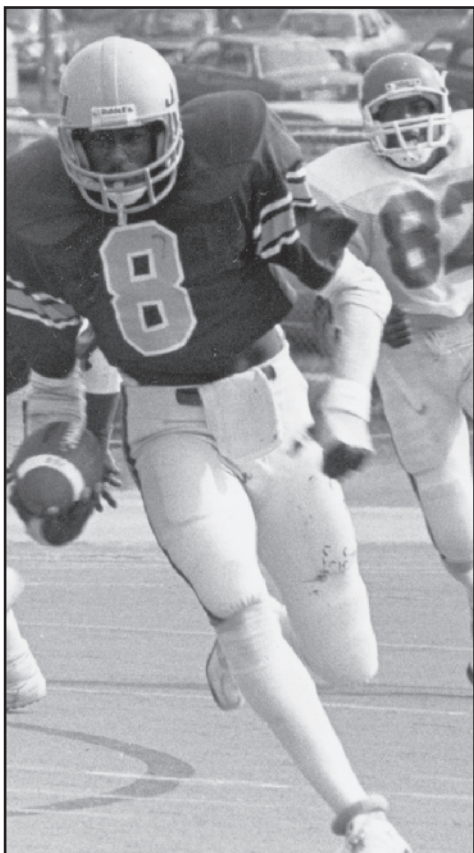

First Duke to receive first-team Division I-AA All-America honors, the first Duke selected in the NFL draft (San Francisco, fourth round, 1986) and the first player to be a member of five winning Super Bowl teams (two with San Francisco, three with Dallas)... 1990 NFC defensive player of the year... Had more than 100 career sacks, including 16 in 1990 when he led the NFC... JMU's career tackles leader (506) and the 1985 Virginia Division I defensive player of the year... Member of JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame, and his JMU number (87) is retired.

### Marshall Barnes (1982-86)

Signed as a free agent defensive back with Dallas of the NFL.

### Arnold Grevious (1983-86)

Signed as a free agent defensive back with Denver of the NFL.

### Warren Marshall (1982-86)

Selected by Denver in the sixth round of the 1987 NFL draft after completing his college career as the all-time leading rusher in JMU and Virginia history... Ran for a still-JMU-record 4,186 yards and had three 1,000-yard rushing seasons... Had JMU's best single-game rushing effort (264 yards) in a 1986 win over then-unbeaten and third-ranked William & Mary and had a team-record 20 career 100-yard rushing games... With the Broncos during their 1987 and eventual Super Bowl season... member of JMU's Athletic Hall of Fame.

### Neal Wilkinson (1984-87)

Came to JMU as a non-scholarship performer but developed into one of the top tight ends in Division I-AA before being chosen in the ninth round of the 1988 NFL draft by Green Bay... On JMU's career receiving lists among tight ends is third in receptions (46), second in receiving yards (866) and first in touchdowns catches (12)... Honorable-mention All-America in 1987... Had six touchdown receptions in 1987, tying Gary Clark's then-JMU-season record.

### Tony Miller (1984-87)

Signed as a free agent wide receiver with Atlanta of the NFL.

### Dion Foxx (1990-93)

A defensive end/outside linebacker and tight end at times as a Duke... Played two NFL seasons with Miami before joining Washington... Led JMU with 6.5 quarterback sacks and was third on the team with 70 tackles in 1993 when he was first-team All-Eastern College Athletic Conference... Caught 14 passes, including four for touchdowns, as a tight end in 1991 and 1992 when he was used on both offense and defense at various times.

### David McLeod (1990-93)

Signed as a free agent wide receiver with Arizona of the NFL... Ended his JMU career as the leading receiver in team history... Had JMU career records of 158 receptions and 2,899 receiving yards and in 1993 caught a then-team-record 64 passes for a team-season-record 1,207 yards and six touchdowns.

### Dwight Robinson (1991-94)

Signed as a free agent defensive back with Toronto of the CFL.

### Mike Cawley (1993-95)

Chosen by Indianapolis in the sixth round of the 1996 NFL draft... Led JMU to the 1994 and 1995 Division I-AA playoffs and is the team's career leader in passing yards (6,482), touchdown passes (42), completions (479) and pass attempts (863)... Set team season passing yardage records in each of his three JMU years.

### Kelly Wiltshire (1993-95)

Signed as a free agent cornerback with Jacksonville of the NFL after JMU's playoff season in 1995.

### David Bailey (1992-95)

Signed as a free agent offensive lineman with Jacksonville after the 1996 NFL draft and played in the World Football League... Among the top linemen on two JMU playoff teams and on several of the top offenses in team history... First-team All-America in 1995 by The Sports Network and *Football Quarterly*.

### Macey Brooks (1993-96)

Chosen as a wide receiver by Dallas in the fourth round of the 1997 NFL draft after completing his JMU career as the team's career touchdown receptions leader... Later played for Chicago... Had 25 career scoring catches, including a team-season-record 14 in 1996 when he was first-team All-Yankee Conference and tied JMU's season scoring record of 84 points... Was a baseball outfielder during his first three JMU years and twice was chosen in the major league baseball draft.

### Jay Jones (1993-96)

Signed as a free agent wide receiver and return specialist with the New York Jets after the 1997 NFL draft and after a senior season in which he led JMU in receptions and was among Division I-AA's top kickoff returners... Set a national Division I-AA record in JMU's 1996 game at Richmond by returning kickoffs for 268 yards... Set a team-game mark of 339 all-purpose yards in the contest... Remained active in arena league play.

### Ed Perry (1993-96)

Chosen by Miami in the sixth round of the 1997 NFL draft and remains with the team after completing his JMU career as the top tight end in team history... Named to the All-Yankee Conference and All-Virginia first teams in each of his final three JMU seasons...

Worked at times as a long snapper on special teams for the Dukes as well as during his professional career.

### Nelson Garner (1994-97)

Signed as a free agent with Baltimore after the 1997 NFL draft... Set then-JMU records for season (43.7 yards per attempt in 1997) and career (41.6) punting average and in 1997 was successful on 13 of 18 field goal tries... Played in the 1997 Blue-Gray Game... Has remained active in arena league play.

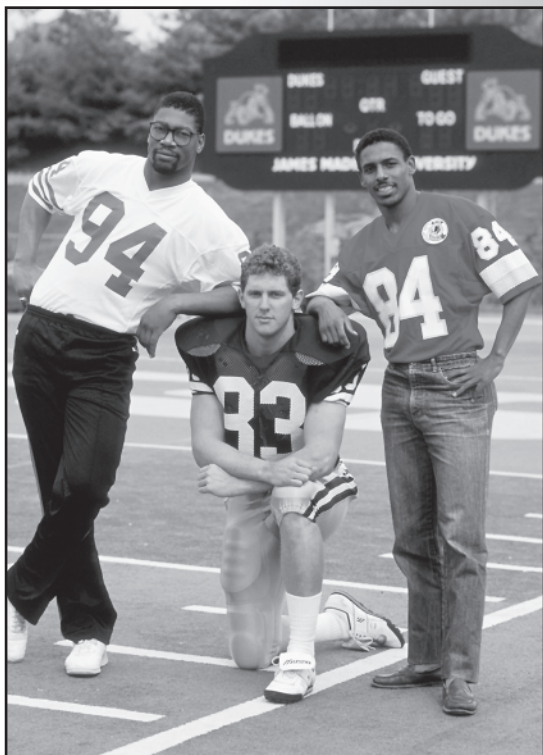
### Tony Booth (1995-98)

Chosen by Carolina in the seventh round of the 1999 NFL draft after being JMU's top defender in 1997 and 1998 as a safety... Had team highs of 122 tackles in 1997 and 106 in 1998... First-team All-America by the Associated Press in 1997 and by the Walter Camp Foundation in 1998... Set a JMU season record and was second nationally in 1997 with eight interceptions.

### Curtis Keaton (1998-99)

Chosen by Cincinnati in the fourth round of the NFL draft and later moved to the New Orleans Saints after having one of the top careers in JMU history... As a senior set JMU season records for rushing yards (1,719), rushing touchdowns (20), overall touchdowns (21), points (126) and all-purpose yards (2,024)... First-team All-America by the American Football Coaches Association, the Atlantic 10's offensive player of the year, and a participant in the Blue-Gray and Hula bowls... His team's most valuable player at the Blue-Gray game and in two JMU seasons after transferring from West Virginia became the program's second-leading career rusher (2,783 yards)... Ran for 30 touchdowns in two JMU seasons and in 1999 had three 200-yard rushing efforts.

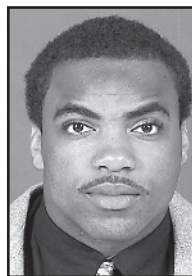
